The death of Mrs. J. Hughes, widow of the late Senator J. J. Hughes, which occurred at her home in Souris yesterday, will be learned with regret by many friends throughout the province.

She was a native of Souris and before her marriage in 1887 to the late Senator Hughes was Miss Annie McWade. She resided in Souris all her life and her passing will be mourned in the community.

Her amiable personality won for her many friends who will cherish her memory. Her husband predeceased her by about a year.

A son, Mr. William Hughes, M.L.A., Souris, and a daughter, Lauretta, Mrs. Joseph MacDonald, Souris, are the only survivors.

The funeral will be held Tuesday morning at 9:30.

Friends throughout the province will learn with regret of the passing in the city yesterday of Mr. John Cumiskey of Charlottetown, formerly of Fort Augustus. Death followed a lengthy illness.

Born at Fort Augustus 35 years ago, he spent his boyhood back there. As a young man he came to Charlottetown and worked for a time as mechanic in the Horse Garage. Later he was employed as a car salesman and in this capacity was well-known in almost every section of the province.
