THE many friends of the Rev. Mr. Tyner were pleased to hear his familiar voice once more, when he preached in the Baptist church, Montague, Sunday morning, Rev. Mal. McLean conducted the evening service.

YESTERDAY the Charlottetown Engineers were inspected at the Park by Major-General O'Grady-Haley. Captain Morris and Lieutenant Lordly were in command. The Engineers were in full strength and presented a fine soldierly appearance. The way the men performed the different difficult movements evidenced the care taken by the officers in having perfection of detail in drill. At the conclusion of the drill the General complimented Captain Morris and Lieut. Lordly, individually on their drill. The Company then returned to the Drill Shed and the construction of a bridge of 180 feet span was commenced. The bridge contains 5 piers made out of casks and ten trestles. During the construction the General witnessed all the movements of the men from a point of advantage. He was also provided with plans of original work in the construction of railroad trestles, the work of Lieut. Lordly. The bridge was not finished owing to the lack of material. This is very much to be regretted as the men were hampered and the time of construction was not taken. At the request of Major-General O'Grady-Haley the bridge will be finished this morning and photographed. The work of construction was witnessed by a large number of citizens and is well worth seeing.
