The Merchants of Montreal then formed themselves into a protective association and proceeded to take evidence themselves. They asked for an audience with Mr. King, and succeeded in getting it, and they went into the matter carefully, fully, and with his Government. But still they got no satisfaction, so they then placed the information they had secured in the hands of Mr. Stevens.

**Up-to-date Milk Plant For Charlottetown**

It has been announced by the Pure Milk Company Limited that they will be open for business Monday morning. This evening at 7 o'clock they will be open for inspection of the public in their building formerly occupied by Messrs Gill & Lantz, corner Fitzroy and Great George Street. This building they have entirely remodelled and repainted the different compartments being separated by glass partitions, and the walls and woodwork attractively painted in white and gray.

The most modern equipment for the clarifying and pasteurizing of milk has been installed, while an efficient method for collecting the milk from the producers has been introduced, the milk being under constant inspection from the source of production to the consumer.

When first taken to the plant, the milk is weighed for flavour, sediment and acidity. It is then passed on to the clarifier which removes the invisible specks of dirt. To make the milk safe from any contamination that might have been picked up after milking it is then passed through a glass lined pasteurizer. It is then put through the internal tube cooler through the automatic hot water filler and capper. Before delivery it is kept in refrigerators thus making a "closed line", the milk not being in contact with the air at any time.

A feature of the new business is the introduction of the "ticket system." By this system the consumer buys tickets and each morning leaves in the bottle a number of tickets representing the amount of milk he wants. The driver leaves the milk and takes the tickets back to the office so that losses are eliminated. This system has been tried out and has been found to be successful in every large city and town in Canada and the United States. The regular cost of tickets is \$1.00 for ten quart tickets but for tonight the management is giving 15 tickets or 15 quarts of milk for \$1.00.

The new establishment is managed by Mr. Chester Cox of this city.

**ANNUAL MEETING CH. TOWN FOX BREEDERS PROTECTIVE ASSN.**

The Annual Meeting of the Charlottetown Fox Breeders Protective Association was held in the office of Mr. W. K. Rogers yesterday afternoon. This organization was formed in the spring of 1925 at a time when the foxing was somewhat prevalent in this province, with the object of safeguarding its members.

A large number of applications were made for membership but it was felt by the charter members that they were not in a position to handle a great membership, so it was restricted to ranches within a short radius of Charlottetown.

The first move was to purchase a highly trained bloodhound. This was bought from the St. Elmo Kennel Club of Louisville, Kentucky. "Gyp the Blood" arrived in Charlottetown early in April, 1925, and his presence at once acted as a deterrent to would be thieves, as his fame had preceded him from the land made famous by Harriet Beecher Stowe. He was of St. John's breed and was a special wire kennel and dog house made for him, a diet sheet as prescribed by the Kennel Club for him, and regular exercising periods with training stunts given him twice weekly.

Mr. Tanton's services in this connection have been most satisfactory and he has rapidly mastered the intricate details of bloodhound management. In this connection it may be said that "Gyp's" feeding schedule differs entirely from that of the domestic dog in that raw beefsteak figures in a considerable quantity three times per week, and there is always a daily ration of meat. He is in prime condition now and in his last trial one week ago was very keen on the scent.

Mr. Tanton has had to reduce somewhat since he took charge of the dog, as "Gyp" follows the trail very smartly, sometimes settling a pace it is very difficult to keep up with, even with the assistance of the leash.

For instance when he was picking up a trail a few months ago for private parties he ran so rapidly that he exhausted both Mr. Tanton and Major Rogers, and their one respite was when he came to a halt, tired that the party had taken but that only took him a very short time to solve and he was off again at a sprinting pace.

Since the dog has been received a great many inquiries have come from parties who have foxes for the use of his services, but this is absolutely against the rules of the Association in that only members are allowed the use of the dog for the protection of "Gyp's" Association.

The next move in the organization was to place signs on all the ranches to the effect that the party was a member of the Charlottetown Fox Breeders Protective Association, that thieving or molesting the ranch would be followed by legal proceedings backed up by a strong organization with large cash resources.

The use of Canada's leading Detective Associations was communicated with and their services retained with the promise of instant cooperation and all their power and strength put on in effort to track down any thieves. They sent a specially trained detective here who got familiar with all the localities of the members and gave instructions as to future procedure.

In order to strengthen every point the next thing was to secure good legal talent and retainers, to handle the affairs of the Association in case of need. It is gratifying to know that during the fifteen months that the Association has been in operation not a single case of theft or injury to a member's ranch has taken place, notwithstanding the fact that others in the vicinity have been broken into and foxes stolen. The Association is pleased with this and hope that they will never have to put the machinery which they control into effect against anyone. At the same time their By-Laws call for merciless prosecution of anyone who molests them or steals from them, and the cash resources available are so large that this prosecution can be pushed to the utmost limits.

Yesterday's meeting was enthusiastic in praise of the good work done and every member feels the benefit of the protection accorded by the Association and is highly gratified at being a member of it. The organization will continue to function in 1926 as presently. In fact it is stronger in resources now than ever before. G. D. MacCallum and child, Summerside.
