THE BLACKS IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Within the British Colonies and Dutch Republics of South Africa is a black native population four times as numerous as those of European blood. These were the original owners of the soil. They must be admitted to have certain rights which Christian Governments are bound to respect, and in that regard the contrast between the treatment accorded to the blacks by the Transvaal and by Cape Colony is very wide indeed. Rev. Charles Phillips, pastor of the Congregational church at Johannesburg has made a statement, quoted in The Outlook in regard thereto which is in part new and wholly interesting and convincing.

Mr. Phillips admits that there may have been some cases of British ill-treatment of the blacks, but these are rare and have not come under his notice, while the fundamental policy of the British system rests upon justice to all. The Transvaal Government or Constitution distinctly provides that there shall be "no equality either in church or state between white and colored." The Cape Colony Constitution allows no difference because of color. Natives in the Transvaal may not use the sidewalks or occupy any but special trucks and railway carriages. In the Transvaal blacks may not engage in commerce, but in Cape Colony they may trade on the same condition as white persons. In the Transvaal the natives may not own land, but they are free to do so in Cape Colony. Mr. Phillips had formerly a native congregation in the Colony, in which nearly every head of a family owned a plot of land and a cottage or hut. In the Transvaal a native can only be legally married by paying fifteen dollars to a Government civil marriage officer. In Cape Colony there is no fee required and every clergyman is a marriage officer.

In the matter of education the Transvaal makes no provision for the teaching of black children, and but little for the children of Outlanders. In Cape Colony education is provided for all natives. In the Transvaal the native cannot obtain

the voting franchise. In Cape Colony the blacks enjoy the franchise on the same terms as the whites. Mr. Phillips further observes that at the Bloemfontein Conference before the war in which the grievance of the Outlanders were discussed, Sir Alfred Milner asked for the white Outlanders in the Transvaal less than is freely conceded to the blacks in Cape Colony. Can any intelligent person who accepts the above stated facts have any doubt as to which is the side of liberty, the British or Boer side, in South Africa?

The death is announced of Alpin Grant a prominent and worthy citizen of Halifax. Mr. Grant was born in Pictou in 1818. Early in life he embarked in newspaper enterprises, and was connected for many years with The Colonist. He was afterwards appointed Queen's Printer of Nova Scotia. In more recent times Mr. Grant was appointed to a position in the railway service, which he resigned on the change of Government in 1896.

Referring to the letter of Humanity in yesterday's issue, the GUARDIAN is informed that it is quite true that there is a man in the Poor House suffering from cancer and it is also true that the man has refused repeatedly to have any operation performed for his relief. Arrangements had been made for his admission to the hospital for operation but he refused to go. As regards the general insanitary state of the Institution, successive Governments have had this fully represented to them without much effect. As is well known there is a competent medical attendant who regularly visits the Poor House.

Nickel Steel Rails.

The Pennsylvania and other railways in the United States have been experimenting with nickel steel rails—so far with excellent results. Many engineers are of opinion that in a few years ordinary steel rails will be superseded by nickel steel rails to the same extent that ordinary armour plates on ships have given place to nickel plates.

Canada has the largest nickel deposits of any country in the world, and in a year or two will be able to turn out steel at the Cape Breton works cheaper than works in Great Britain or the United States. About 5 per cent. of nickel is used in the rails being experimented with. What is to prevent nickel steel rails being manufactured at Sidney?

A Nova Scotian's Death.

At Boston Saturday afternoon Harry Rose, an employe of the Boston Elevated Railroad Co., was engaged drilling holes in rails being laid on Massachusetts Avenue. He was working over a manhole, the cover of which had been removed temporarily, when he lost his balance and fell into the hole. His body doubled up when he struck the opening and was carried away instantly by the deep heavy current of the water. Just before midnight the body reached the pumping station at Dorchester and was removed from the water. At 10 Greenwood park, Dorchester, where Rose boarded it was stated that he was unmarried, and arrived in Boston only about three weeks ago from Nova Scotia, where his mother and father live. Just what part of Nova Scotia he came from his landlady did not know. He was at work the greater part of each day, and the people in the house with him had not been able to learn much of his history.
