MANCHESTER, England, Dec. 5 (CP)—At the annual dinner of the Manchester Geographical Society the president expressed astonishment at the lack of interest in geography by the modern boy. He said that a lecture on the 1938 attempt to climb Everest by 30 per cent of the children who attended in the afternoon were girls. Responding, Admiral Sir William Goodenough suggested that the reason for the schoolboy's indifference was the failure to introduce sufficient human interest. The youth of the country was more interested in the human race and the effect that geographical conditions had on character.

## Scout News and Notices

Providing messengers at the annual international plowing match at Minesing was a new rural Scouting service found by Boy Scouts of Barrie, Ont.

The Empire's headquarters training centre for Boy Scouts leaders, Gilwell Park, near London, reported the attendance of 72 Overseas Scouters during the past summer. They came from British Guiana, Burma, Canada, Gibraltar, Jamaica, Malaya, New Zealand, Nigeria, Southern Rhodesia, Tanganyika, Trinidad and Uganda. The Boy Scouts of Banff, Alberta, made a canvass of every residence in town for discarded clothing and footwear for their friends the Indians on the Morley Reserve. The boys' announcement in the Banff "Crag and Canyon" reminded citizens of the "ful part" the Indians had played in portraying Indian Days at local celebrations.

A story told on himself by the Bishop of Sheffield at a Boy Scout dinner relates how he was once struggling against a gale on the Brighton sea front, when an elderly lady was blown round the corner into his arms. When he had disengaged himself and the lady had regained her noise, the latter said, "Oh thank you, sir. You are so helpful that I am sure you must be a Scout, though I am so near-sighted that I cannot see your knees."

That Scouting is a true method of education was the declaration of His Eminence Cardinal Villeneuve at a dinner banquet tendered him by the Catholic Boy Scout Federation of Quebec. He declared the Scout system of training to be a method which seeks to cultivate the personality of the boy, "striving to lead him to his maximum of human value as well. For one cannot make a well-integrated man who is not useful to society and to his nation."

The Boy Scout movement neither removes the necessity nor mitigates the importance of education within the family, the school or the church. It rounds out those forms of education. As a method of education Scouting does not consider itself exclusive, but it takes the boy in all his physical, intellectual and moral being and works to bring out his manhood."

# ATTENTION POULTRY PRODUCERS

Practically All Poultry Is Bought and Sold According to Government Grades.

YOU get these higher prices by a simple method of crate fattening your poultry on a mixture of finely ground home grains mixed with milk or buttermilk or some protein concentrate.

Good results will be obtained if the birds are put in disinfected crates in a reasonably warm place free from drafts. Feed twice daily, morning and evening, for twenty minute intervals, then remove feed troughs.

## KILLING and CARE

This is very important. Starve birds 24 hours before killing, during which time they should have access to plenty of clean drinking water. Birds must be properly bled. Make sure all feathers are removed from wing-tips, legs and close as possible to the head. See that all pin feathers are removed, also that heads, feet, and vents are clean.

After killing, hang birds in a cool place but do not freeze.

Market birds soon as possible after cooling.

Ship in ventilated containers holding not only 100 lbs. Ship daily if possible.
