During the next two weeks Red Cross Swimming Tests will be given at the various centres where classes have been conducted this summer.

On Monday, August 19th, Mrs. Earl Taylor, examiner for the Royal Life Saving Society will test candidates for the Award of Merit, Silver Medalion, Tuesday Red Cross examiners will visit St. Peter's Bay classes, which have been taught by Francis Ledwell and Ted Sanders. The local chairman in this district is Mr. Daniel McDonald.

Sports Classes have been supervised by Mr. James Kelly and will be tested Wednesday afternoon, August 21st, Mr. Reginald Rogers, Chairman of the Borden Swimming and Water Safety Committee has been untiring in his efforts to get this program established in this town. In Georgetown Mr. Waldron Lavers is the local Chairman, and classes conducted by James Mair and Fenwick Lavers will be tested on Friday, August 23rd, in the afternoon.

Pupils of the Charlottetown classes will be tested on Saturday morning August 24th, at Brighton Beach and on Monday morning, Miss Evelyn Henry's class at Kep-look will be examined. Monday afternoon the examiners will be at Cardigan where the local Chairman is Mr. R. J. McDonald. There the instructor is Miss Phyllis Agnew, Miss Grace Lewis and Mr. Ernest MacDonald. In Morell Mr. Edward Anderson is the Chairman and Mr. Joseph Kelly the very enthusiastic instructor. Tests for these classes will be held on Tuesday morning, August 27th. From Morell the examiners will go to St. John's where the classes which have been taught by Mr. Gordon Farrell and Mr. Stuart Curry in St. John's. Mr. Melvin McQuaid is the Chairman of the Committee for Swimming and Water Safety.

In Montague a few very energetic citizens have helped greatly with this branch of Red Cross work. Wilfred Emman a suitable raft was constructed and several business men have loaned trucks to transport the pupils to and from the beach. Reiser Entire Show In Dodgers' Win

Pete Reiser was the whole show Sunday as the National League leading Brooklyn Dodgers edged out Philadelphia Phillies 3-2 before 28,000 Brooklyn fans.

The Dodger outfielder rapped out three hits including a home run and double, drove in two runs and scored the other. Reiser romped in with the deciding run in the eighth inning, with two out, Phil second baseman Emil Verban fumbled a ground ball by pinch-hitter Gene Herranski. Reiser had opened the frame with a double and moved to third on Dixie Walker's infield out.

Joe Medwick, pinchhitting for the Dodgers in the seventh inning was hit below the left ear with a pitch by Hoerst. He was taken to a hospital suffering from a concussion and X-rays will be taken to determine whether there is a fracture.

Led by Harry Brecheen and Dick Sisler, St. Louis Cardinals measured Cincinnati Reds twice 3-2 and 2-0, and once more by out-throwing the Dodgers.

Brecheen turned in a seven-hit pitching performance, matched by Ed Hahn and Clyde Slocum together but Grady Hatton's double was as close as any of the Reds ever got to home plate.

Sisler whose pinch hit off Joe Beggis in the 13th inning of the first game scored Stan Musial with the winning run, singled in the second inning, the nightcap to score Emos Slaughter, who had doubled. Marty Marion a few moments later drove in Sisler.

Cincinnati loaded the bases with two outs in the 11th inning but Al Brazie survived the crisis.

New York Giants' home polo attendance passed the 1,000,000 mark yesterday when 23,204 cash customers saw them divide a double-header with Boston Braves.

The throng increased the Giants' total to 1,004,197.

Johnny Sain registered his 14th victory in perfect condition, five runs against the Philadelphia Phillies 7-1 in the second game after the polo grounders had slugged out an 8-5 triumph in the opener.

Bobby Blatner, Giant second baseman, tied a modern major league record in the first game by making 11 assists. The feat equalled the performance of several other second basemen through John Montgomery Ward of the 1892 Brooklyn club handled 12 in a single contest.

Chicago Cubs also passed the 1,000,000 paid attendance mark as they downed Pittsburgh Pirates 8-0 before a throng of 20,000.

The paid crowd of 30,865 boosted the season mark to 1,010,994.

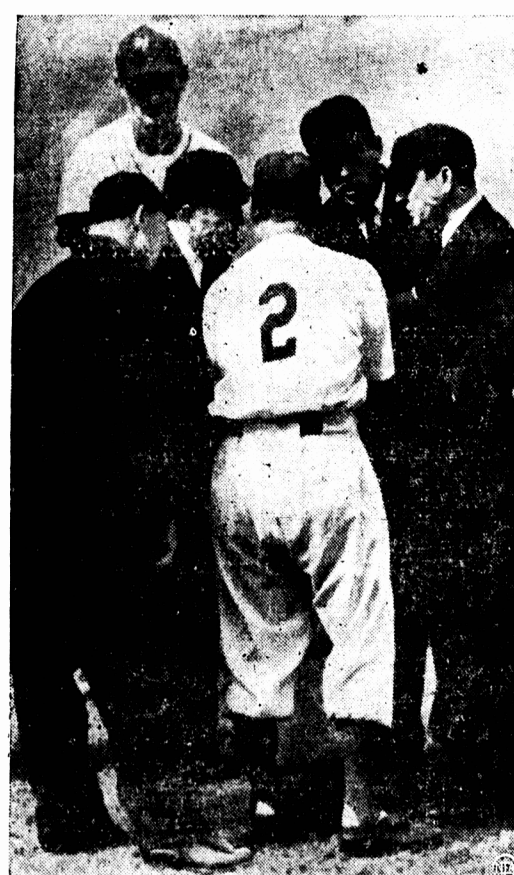

Sox Increase Lead Over "Bombers"

Unable to score against their nearest rivals in the first game, the per-nit-headed Boston Red Sox came from behind in the nightcap Sunday to split a double-header with New York Yankees. The Sox took the first 6-0 of the neat six-hit shutout pitching of Bill Bevens and the Sox won the second 4-3.

The split gave the Sox three victories in the four-game series and also gave the American League leaders a 10-3 advantage in game over the Yankees for the season.

Bevens' whitewash job was well done. Only one man even approached the plate with a score. That was Wally Moses, who was thrown out by centre fielder Johnny Lindel. Moses had doubled and tried to score on Johnny Pesky's shot to centre.

In the closer, the Yanks led 3-2 going into the home half of the eighth. Ted Williams, who got only two hits all day opened by doubling off the left field fence. He scored when Page hit Bobby Doerr in the back after fielding Bobby's sacrifice bunt. Doerr came in on Mike Higgins' second double of the game, also off the left field barrier.

The seventh place St. Louis Browns came from behind in both games to sweep their doubleheader from Detroit Tigers 4-3 and 6-5 humiliating the world champion Bengals in front of the largest cash crowd in Detroit baseball history—97,235 fans.

The record turnout boosted Detroit's home attendance to 1,377,403 for the year (56 games) to shatter the Tigers' best previous year's mark, 1,280,141 established last season.

Scoring 10 runs in two big innings, Cleveland Indians beat Chicago White Sox 13-3 in the nightcap after dropping the 11-inning opener 6-4.

A timely hit and good relief hurling by Sid Hudson enabled Washington Senators to trip Philadelphia Athletics 6-4 after the A's had taken the opener 11-0.

The Mackmen ran away with the first game when they socked three Washington pitchers for 15 safeties, including Sam Chapman's 17th homer of the season.

"A Common Cold Research Unit" is being established by Britain's Medical Research Council and Ministry of Health and will start work this month at the Harvard Hospital, near Salisbury, says W. K. Hutcheon, office.

The problem of the common cold is a particularly complex one, more difficult because, apart from chimpanzees, which are unsatisfactory for experimental purposes, has not yet proved possible to study it in animals.

Therefore, the first objective on the present investigation, into the common cold is to find a susceptible animal or, better still, some other laboratory technique which will permit a scientific approach to the problem. As a check on their laboratory studies, workers at the National Institute of Medical Research will, at least for the time being, require to test on human volunteers the cold-producing activities of materials they are studying.

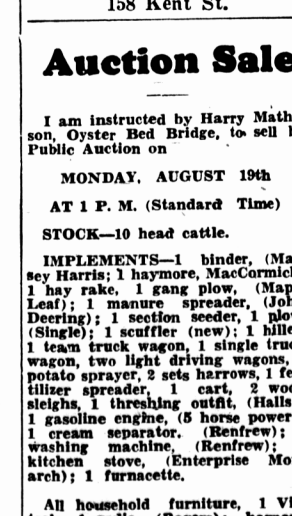
