The services in St. James' Church tomorrow will be conducted by the Rev. T. F. Fullerton who will take as his texts for morning and evening "Sacrifice an Element of Worship" and "Savonarola" respectively.

The vacant parish of Bridgewater has unanimously offered the rectorship to the Rev. C. R. Cumming, rector of Weymouth. Mr. Cumming has not yet given his answer. Much regret will be felt by the people of Weymouth if he should accept, as he is very popular in that community, and is doing a splendid work there. He was highly recommended by the bishop of the diocese. Mr. Cumming is becoming one of the strong men of the diocese, and is a preacher considerably above the average.—Halifax Herald. (Mr. Cumming is well known here.)

The many friends of Alexander Laird, North Rustico, will be grieved to learn of his death, which took place on the 16th day of April, after a brief illness of three weeks. The remains were laid to rest in Cavendish Cemetery. His Pastor, Rev. John Sterling, and a solemn service conducted the funeral service. Mr. Laird was a member of the Presbyterian Church, for many years, and died trusting in his Saviour. Deceased was of a kind and loving disposition ever ready to help his neighbors and fellow man. Besides a sorrowing widow he leaves to mourn six sons and three daughters, all of whom were able to be at his bedside, except two sons, Theophilus, in Berkley, Cal., and Isaac, in Somerville, Mass. They all mourn the loss of a kind and loving husband and father, but they have that hope of meeting again on the other shore in the sweet by-and-by.

At a recent meeting of the Cumberland County Council an interesting proposition was placed before that body by H. J. Logan and A. D. Provand, of the old Ship Railway. In brief the proposition was to build a steam railway from the Port Lawrence Dock to the Tidnish Dock and then on through Lorneville and to Northport. It is proposed further to connect this same railway with an electric road running from Fort Lawrence to Amherst and thence on to Tidnish. Mr. Provand has two propositions in mind; a steam railway and an electric railway; using the one set of rails for both projects. Mr. Dougan pointed to the fact that such a railway running from Port Lawrence to Tidnish would open up a fine strip of agricultural country. Mr. Provand and his associates had also under consideration a line of vessels between Tidnish and Prince Edward Island and the produce from Prince Edward Island also would be carried to Tidnish, then over the railway line to Fort Lawrence and thence on to the markets of St. John, Portland and Boston.—Sackville Post.

W. Webb and E. Peddie, London, England, and J. Mullan, Belfast, Ireland, who have been in this city for the past few days enquiring into the suitability of this province as a field for emigration from the Mother Country left yesterday on the Earl Grey. They go to Annapolis on a similar mission. They are employed by the Dominion Government and are part of a small contingent of men who have come to this country on such a mission. Their work is to meet the farmers and get in touch with the actual conditions in the various Provinces. The first batch of immigrants, 22 men, 15 women and four children will arrive next Monday. They are mostly from Scotland and are a fine class of people. A number are ready to take up farms, others are farm laborers and some will enter service as domestics.

The death of Charles J. Irving, of Seal River, occurred on the 15th inst. Early in the winter Mr. Irving had a severe attack of the grippe, from which he had apparently recovered, and was enjoying his usual health until Friday last, when he was taken very ill, and in less than twenty-four hours the struggle was over and he had passed to his eternal rest in Paradise. The deceased was a man of sterling character, always kind and cheerful. His memory will long be cherished by those who were intimately acquainted with him. The funeral to the English church at Cherry Valley was on Tuesday last, where the service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Winter. The pall bearers were Peter Melsaac, John Doyle, John Carrier, Dingwell Jenkins, Geo. Carrier and Thomas Crane. A widow and three children are left to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate husband and father.

The Canadian Farm's P. E. Island correspondent has the following in the recent issue of that journal: A new barn 40 by 60 is to be erected on the Experimental Farm. Accommodation will be made for horses and steers. There will also be sample and seed rooms for grains from the plots. A small quantity of Marquis wheat was sold this year for experimental purposes and distributed in small lots all over the Island. The wheat is supplied on the farm at \$1.50 for cost much more if ordered through seedsmen. A series of five different rotations of crops will be originated this season, ranging from three to seven years. There will be 150 different plots for vegetables, and the experimental department will be considerably extended this spring. A distribution of potatoes will be made after the first week in April to all who have applied for samples, either at Ottawa or at the farm.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made by any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each year from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$8.00 per acre.—Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
