The death occurred in Summerside Sunday of Mrs. Thomas Haye, of this city. Yesterday the body was brought to the city on the noon train and was taken to the residence of her son, Charles Waye, Gaytown, from where the funeral will take place. This will not be held until the arrival of a daughter from the United States.

At a recent meeting of this Institute Bradford Millman was appointed delegate to attend the short course at Truro Agricultural College next month. John A. Millman, also a member of the institute is going to take his second term at Truro this winter. New London North has taken a new lease of life and all look for some interesting meetings this winter. The regular meetings are held the first Saturday in each month in Long River Hall at seven o'clock p. m.

The games between the city teams are not necessarily played on the same days as the hockey match and the first one will be played this evening at seven-thirty in the Arena. The teams will be: Abegweits - J. Strain, G. Worth, J. McKay, J. Kimball and Capt. D. A. McKinnon. Victorias - Vernon G. Jewers, Victor McLeod, "Nick" Curry, S. B. Crockett and W. B. Prowse, spare. The Summerside boys are said to be in good trim and the contest for supremacy between the three rival clubs will undoubtedly excite much interest. A trophy will probably be awarded but this is not definitely settled upon.

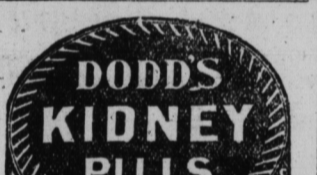
