THE Presbyterian Witness says: A P. E. ISLAND correspondent tells us of Rev. D. B. MacLeod's visit on behalf of the Century Fund to Wood Islands, Murray Harbor River, and Murray Harbor South, on the 19th ult. On Monday he preached at Little Sands. In all these places he made an eloquent and forcible presentation of the case, and was heard with deep interest. At Little Sands nine friends remained at the close of the meeting and subscribed \$73. At all these places arrangements were made for collecting.

THE Halifax Herald says: There are no material changes in country produce. There is a large quantity of pork in this market and with the mild weather the price has declined 4¢ to 5¢ for both light and heavy. Lamb is scarce, and fowls are dull at 30c to 40c per pair. Potatoes are selling at 27 to 28c ex vessel, 26c being accepted for larger quantities. Eggs have advanced and are quoted in case lots at 18c. P. E. Island oats are quoted in bulk at 35c to 36c. Some of the hay that comes to this market is reported to be inferior, farmers holding back the better qualities. The range of prices is from \$9.50 to \$11.00 per ton. Cheese remains at 12c wholesale. Butter is higher. Potatoes P. E. I. per bushel 27 to 28c oats P. E. I. in bulk 35 to 36c.
