MONTREAL, Oct. 24.—(Special).—The shareholders of the Dominion Cotton Co. are panic stricken and the stock sold today for 50, the lowest price in years.

It has been paying six per cent. on common stock and sold above par last year.

A SHRINKAGE OF \$1,500,000.
