Markets At A Glance

(Canadian Press) Toronto and Montreal—Stocks quiet and lower. Mines—Gold shares sharply higher; other groups strong. New York—Stocks heavy at close. Winnipeg—Wheat closed higher, sugar and coffee higher.

LIVESTOCK

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 18.—Offerings on the two Montreal livestock markets today totaled 15,477. Cattle receipts were 1,309. Buyers were actively engaged in the early part of the day on small stock, particularly lambs. Cattle were slow to start and there were not enough early sales to form a basis for quotations. The offering was made up almost entirely of cattle of common to just medium finish with a comparatively large percentage of light unfinished. Calf receipts were 2,968. Calves were easier and were estimated to be 25 cents lower than some estimates running up to 50 cents lower. Good veals were from \$9.75 to \$6.25, the latter price being for choice stock picked out.

PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 18.—Prices on the Montreal dairy and produce market were generally higher at the close of today's active trading. Butter and cheese were aided by a further rise in sterling while strength in eggs was brought about by firmer markets at other points and growing scarcities of real fresh stock.

Currency

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 18.—The United States dollar touched the lowest level since last July when it declined to a nominal of two per cent on Montreal foreign exchange 63 days. The pound after early strength was 200 lower but the majority of other currencies were higher. The United States dollar opened one per cent lower at a premium of 2 1/2 per cent, then dipped to two per cent where it was the lowest since July 19 but recovered to 2 1/2 per cent its closing price and down 1 1/2 per cent from Saturday. The pound sterling rose 2 1/2 cents at the opening being quoted at \$4.90 and quickly mounted to a high of \$4.91 1/2. In the afternoon the rate slipped back to \$4.89 and then to \$4.87 1/2 where it closed with a loss of 1/2 of a cent. The French franc was up .09 of a cent at 61.2 cents.
