NEW YORK, April 4 (CP)—New York Rangers, two games to the good, leave late tonight for Toronto where the Stanley Cup final against Toronto Maple Leafs will be resumed Saturday night. "They'll be a very tough club on their own ice," Ranger Manager Lester Patrick said while discussing the Leafs' chances of taking four of the five games they need to win the cup. "But they'll need to be more tough than that; they would have to be a super team."

More Than Trip At Stake In Eastern Jr. Hockey Finals

TORONTO, April 4 (CP)—There will be more to shoot at than just a trip out west for the Memorial Cup when Verdun and Oshawa Generals meet here tomorrow night in the first game of the eastern Canada junior hockey final. In Verdun's case there's a little matter of revenge that's been hanging fire since last Spring. Just a year ago Oshawa beat the Quebec champions on their march to the Canadian championship. The best-of-three series went the limit, Verdun winning the first at home and dropping the next two on Toronto ice. It was even a tougher test than Generals encountered in the cup finals against Edmonton Roamers.

Now these two teams are back again. But if the setup is the same the actors are different. Billy (The Kid) Taylor is not around with his Verdun as he did last year with his dazzling dashes. Nor is Jimmy Furrmond, whose defensive play sparked Taylor back into the Verdun Drummond jumped to senior hockey.

On the other hand there are two Montreal boys with the Generals

who are bound to prove troublesome to the Quebec champions. They are Frankie Eddolls, a star defenceman with Verdun last year, and Buddy Helyer, ex-Montreal Royals junior.

Both boys are important cogs in the well-greased Oshawa machine which knocked over a brilliant Toronto Marlboro crew to win the Ontario Hockey Association and then cleaned up on South Porcupine in two games by a total-goal count of 20-2. Most of the other Oshawa players performed against Verdun last year. Loss of Taylor has lessened the credit on individuals in the Generals' system of pay with the result the Ontario champions are a better balanced club than the 1939 squad. Reports from the eastern metropolitan rate Verdun stronger than last year. All of which adds up to the belief that a tidy argument is in the offing. Second game of the best-of-three series is scheduled for Monday next Wednesday. Two Maritime officials will handle the games. They are George Clark of Middleton.

Lloyd Mangrum Takes Lead In Golf Annual

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 4 (AP)—They drew lines from tees to greens today at the Augusta National Golf Club, and Lloyd Mangrum followed them all. Hitting woods and irons as if the ball was tied to those lines, the 24-year-old assistant professional from Oak Park, Ill., took the lead in the first round of the seventh annual Master's Golf Tournament with a 64 that set all sorts of records. It was eight under par for one of the most testing courses in the United States. It broke the course record held jointly by Gene Sarazen and Byron Nelson. It set a new competitive record for championship golf in the United States. For 18 holes of tough tournament golf, Mangrum hit every green in the required number of shots. He bagged four birdies on the out-going nine for a 32, then started the back nine with a bogey five on the 10 hole, where he took three putts. Already up on the score board was a 67 for another Texan, Jimmy Demaret of Houston. That round had included a record six-under-par 30 for the back nine, and looked like the goods.

Take 1-0 Victory Over Blue Devils In Third Tilt Of Eastern Semi-finals

OTTAWA, April 4 (CP)—Sydney Millionaires came through with a second period goal tonight that gave them a 1-0 victory over Kirkland Lake Blue Devils and sent their best-of-three Allan Cup eastern Canada semi-final series into a fourth game at Toronto Saturday. Big Remi Van Daele turned the trick all alone to give the Maritime senior hockey champions their victory. It was the first win of the series for the Millionaires, the Blue Devils having taken the first game of the series 6-3 in Toronto and the teams tied 3-3 in overtime here Tuesday.

A crowd of 7,928 saw the teams fight through 60 minutes of bumping hockey with the Millionaires holding a shade the best of things almost all the time. They doled out more bodychecks and they were heavier than anything the Devils offered. The Millionaires skated a trifle faster, perhaps. And they took advantage of their one real break of the game to score. The goal came at 7:06 of the second period and at no time was the pressure heavier around the Sydney net when the play got under way. There were only Tony Graboski, Van Daele and Doug Fritz on the ice when Graboski relieved the pressure by hooking the puck out about to the blue line. The peregrinating Pole went after it, over skated it and saw Van Daele sweep up to take the loose rubber. As he moved down the ice like a rocket, two Kirkland Lakers vainly tried to catch him. Just as he let go, Cooper man-

aged to skate Remi into the boards but the shot was away and goalie Bill Durnan let it whiz past. Van Daele, firing from the left wing, caught the upper right hand corner of the net cleanly. From there on it was a case of Sydney holding off the Lakers who sent wave after wave of sharpshooters at goalie Bill Dickey. He handled everything with ease though there were times when lady luck smiled on him. Twice in the second period, Jo-Jo Graboski should have had a goal. With Dickey beaten he flipped his shot over the net and another time hit the post. Offsetting that were two occasions when big Tom Williams had Durnan beaten cold after wading through Kirkland Lake players who buzzed around him like hornets, only to fire smack dab at the Devils' netminder.

Maple Leafs Far From Beaten Coach Dick Irvin Says As Team Goes Home

(By Jack Calder, Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, April 4 (CP)—Coach Dick Irvin, ushering his Toronto Maple Leafs back to town smiled through a drizzle of rain today and spoke bravely. "We're far from beaten yet," he said. "We've been trying for the Stanley Cup too long to let anything get us down." These were astoundingly gallant words from a man whose hockey club has just lost the first two games of Stanley Cup finals to New York Rangers, and who personally had lost more than \$200 to a sneak-theft. But Irvin got braver as he went along. "The rest of the series is being played in Toronto, even if it goes to seven games," he pointed out. "That should be an advantage to us. Then I like the spirit of the boys after those beatings. They were glum at first but now they're grim." The Rangers defeated the Leafs 2-1 in overtime Tuesday night and then licked them 6-3 last night just before the circus moved into Madison Square Garden to end New York's home season. Irvin lost his wallet to someone who sneaked into his hotel room, while Nick Metz and Pep Kelly of the Leafs were also robbed as they slept. "I didn't mind losing last night's game so much," the grey-haired coach said. "Three or four players were off-color and I don't think the Rangers will ever play better than they did last night."
