Nazis Promise Finns Armed Help

STOCKHOLM, June 27 (AP) — The Finnish government said tonight Germany has promised all the armed help needed by the Finns for them to continue the war against Russia.

A communique announced in Helsinki said "perfect understanding concerning the views of the Finnish and German governments" had been reached in discussions last week.

LONDON, June 27 (CP) — The Berlin radio today said that German foreign Minister Ribbentrop had conferred with Finnish leaders at Helsinki and had promised that Germany would comply with Finnish demands for more arms and military help.

"Complete agreement was reached," the broadcast said.

Unfavorable Weather For Air Operations

LONDON, June 27 (AP) — American heavy bombers and fighters from Italy attacked Budapest military targets and Yugoslav railway yards today, while the R. A. F.'s heavy bombers, in one of their rare daylight missions, attacked German flying-bomb installations across the Channel from England in unfavorable weather.

The Halifax mission from Britain, made without loss, was the first heavy-bomber operation in 48 hours and the first blow since last Sunday on the Nazi flying-bomb emplacements in France.

The enemy projectiles continued to fall in southern England throughout Monday night, and Tuesday with slightly increased intensity. A school and post office were among the buildings hit.

Monday's American attack on Poland was at a point about 70 miles west of the German-Russian front lines. American and Russian fighters accompanied the bombers. Good results were reported in excellent weather.

Excise Tax On Furs Extended

OTTAWA, June 27 (CP) — The Excise Tax of 25 per cent on furs has been extended in the new budget to cover imported garments.

As the law stood, separate furs imported paid the 25 per cent tax but it did not apply, for example, to furs on an imported coat. It did not make any difference in the past because there was a law prohibiting the importation of fur garments but now that the prohibition has been lifted by the budget, the tax provisions had to be extended to cover such garments.

HEALTH REPORT

POLICE REPORT

A total of \$651.75 was collected in fines and costs during May, Chief of Police A. Birtwistle said in a report to the City Council. During the month there were 34 arrests and 29 convictions. Arrests showed an increase of 10 over the previous month. There were five prosecutions and convictions under the excise act for unlawful possession of beer or spirits; nine prosecutions and convictions under the wartime prices and trade regulations for unlawful sale or purchase of gasoline. The report said that 850 bicycle licenses had been issued to date this year.

Airman Awarded V. C. Posthumously

LONDON, June 27 (CP-Reuters) — Pilot Officer Cyril Joe Barton of London, captain of an R. A. F. Halifax bomber, has been posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross for "unsurpassed courage and devotion to duty in the face of almost impossible odds" while making a crash landing in this war.

Excellent Growing Season Reported at Experimented Farm

Conditions at the Dominion Experimented Station are a general "very satisfactory," and indicate a season of great prosperity, officials report.

The crop show greater promise than for many years. Half of the clover is now in full bloom, and it is expected the cutting, which will begin about July 1, Green feed cutting began this week.

In addition to 100 varieties of crops, there are many vegetables such as peas, and beans, and onions, grown experimentally, which are making rapid progress. Potatoes are doing very well throughout the Province, and the strawberry crop is abundant. This applies also to other fruits, including currants, raspberries, and bushes are laden with fruit. 1,050 chickens have been raised, of which 300 cockerels have already been sold. A fact of further interest is that 300 pheasants have been hatched. The past winter season, as at the present season, was particularly favourable for hatching. The leading hen of the farm has laid 250 eggs within the past 10 months.

Approximately 80 sows have been qualified at the advance registry station. 13 cows are in milk at the present time. There are seven heifer calves.

The grounds present an especially attractive appearance at this season. The lawns of vivid green after the recent rainfall, the luxuriance of foliage and shrubbery, and the multi-coloured floral display are very picturesque.

There are numerous delphiniums, as well as a fine collection of larkspur, but the preponderance of bloom is on the iris, while the rose thorn makes the most spectacular showing at present. In addition to the few remaining lilacs, known as the syringa emodi type, there is one surviving rhododendron. This latter flower exists in three places only in the Maritimes, namely in the Public Gardens, Halifax, at Annapolis Royal and at the local Experimented Farm.

The most outstanding feature of the grounds is the perennial bed which is in constant bloom, and how is colourful with lily, iris and fire-bush.

The roses and peonies, which have not yet come into their own, promise to make a very successful and beautiful array.

Three Great Powers Chief Peace Hope Says Archbishop

YORK, ENGLAND, June 27 (CP-Reuters) — The Archbishop of York, Dr. Cyril Garbett, in his Presidential address to the York Diocesan conference here today declared "the chief hope for the future peace of the world is that the three great Allies should continue the closest co-operation when Germany and Japan are conquered."

"If these three peoples, the United States, Russia and ourselves, stood together determined to stop any future outbreak of war, the peace of the world would be secure."

"I am not suggesting that the world for all time should be controlled by the three great Allies," he said.

"Eventually all nations should take, each according to its power, some responsibility for the preservation of peace."

"But for some time to come the three great Allies will have the resources to do this effectively."

Bishop Boyle Is Guest At Banquet

ANTIGONISH, N. S. June 27 (CP) — Most Rev. James Morrison, D. D. Archbishop of Antigonish, and Most Rev. James Boyle, D. D. Bishop of Charlottetown, were guests of honor of the clergy of the Diocese of Antigonish last night at a testimonial banquet. The banquet held at St. Francis Xavier university was attended by over 100 priests.

In an address written by Lieut. Col. the Rev. R. C. MacGillivray, and read on behalf of the clergy by Rev. A. Johnston, New Waterford, Bishop Boyle was honored on his recent election to the Episcopate.

Casualties In Italy Revealed

OTTAWA, June 27 (CP) — The Defence Department said in a statement today that an announcement by Prime Minister Churchill today that British Commonwealth casualties suffered in Italy from Feb. 3, 1943 to Feb. 12, 1944, were 36,826.

Of this total, Mr. Churchill said, 7,635 were killed, 3,283 wounded and 5,708 missing.

"Canadian casualties included in this total during the same period were 1,259 killed and died of wounds; 4,090 wounded and 316 missing and prisoner of war," the departmental statement said.

"The Prime Minister also announced that from Feb. 12, 1944 until the fall of Rome there had been additional Commonwealth casualties of killed, 6,696; wounded 24,683 and missing 5,117, a total of 36,496."

"Of these Canada suffered 1,009 killed and died of wounds; 542 wounded and 184 missing and prisoner of war."

The statement said that total Canadian casualties suffered in Italy
