MOTHER HOLDS UP MCADOO WEDDING

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 30.—Indefinite postponement of the projected marriage of Ellen Wilson McAdoo, granddaughter of Woodrow Wilson, and Rafael Lopez de Onate, handsome actor twice her age, was announced today by the young woman's mother. Immediately there were whispers of a possible elopement.

Objections raised by Senator William G. McAdoo, father of the 19-year-old girl, were made known while a tempest still raged about the question of de Onate's racial origin.

The mother, Mrs. Eleanor Wilson McAdoo, who recently divorced the California senator, made the announcement from her sick bed. Miss McAdoo was not available for comment.

De Onate, regarded in Hollywood as one of the most handsome and accomplished actors in Spanish-speaking films, disconnected his telephone. From the actor's friends it was learned he was upset by the publicity following the interposing of a question as to whether he is of Spanish blood, as he claims, or of Filipino or Malay stock. His friends said he was confident he

could establish beyond doubt there was no other strain than Spanish in his blood.

The California law does not permit intermarriage of Caucasians and Filipinos.

SEES TOURIST TRAVEL AS PEACE FACTOR

D. Leo Dolan Speaks Optimistically Of Tourist Trade At Canadian Club, Boston.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, Oct. 30.—Development of the tourist industry between Canada and the United States can "forge a new instrument for peace" between the two countries, said D. Leo Dolan, of Ottawa, in addressing the Canadian Club of Boston tonight. Chairman at the dinner was Ernest Goudey, formerly of Yarmouth, N. S.

Mr. Dolan is director of the recently-established Canadian Travel Bureau, and he urged an ever-increasing tourist traffic between the United States and Canada.

"International movements in the world, today are being offset by intense nationalism, such as sum, as might follows day prejudices and ill-will, born of ignorance, will be upon us unless we keep wide open the gates of understanding and knowledge of each other," Mr. Dolan warned his audience. "I believe we can be better friends and better neighbors the more we mingle with one another, the more we learn to appreciate the aims, the hopes and the ambitions of our respective countries," he asserted.

Mr. Dolan described to his audience the genesis of the Canadian Travel Bureau. He referred to the fact that Senator W. H. Dennis, of Halifax, had been the instigator of the country upon the importance of the tourist industry; and that subsequently a special committee of the Senate had recommended creation of the Bureau. This recommendation had been carried out by the government and the Bureau established under Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railway and Canals.

"The people of the United States spend on travel last year the astounding figure of \$5,000,000,000," said Mr. Dolan. "Canadians believe, and I think with some justification, that we have something in our country which should secure a fair percentage of this \$5,000,000,000," he continued. "I think we should attract some of this money because I am confident that Canada has to offer the vacationist attractions which are so varied and interesting to the American's great army of vacationists need not leave this continent to enjoy a holiday that meets the demands of the most fastidious traveller."

He referred to the tourist attractions of each of the nine provinces and made special reference to the National Parks of the Dominion.

Mr. Dolan stressed "the great need of reciprocity of travel between the United States and Canada." Last year, he said, estimates showed that Canadian travellers spent approximately \$40,000,000 in the United States. Per capita Canadians travelled in the United States a great deal more than did United States citizens in Canada.

French Countess Tends Trap-Line

(By The Canadian Press) COLD LAKE, Man., Oct. 30.—The lure of the Northland has proven stronger than the security of a comfortable chateau in Europe for the Countess Guyot de Mishaegen, who will spend the winter moving over her trap lines north of here in search of fine fur.

The countess, a robust woman who prefers to travel simply as Mrs. Mishaegen has prepared several camps north of here. Seasoned trappers will aid her in covering an extensive territory to be staked out between now and freeze-up.

The titled Belgian woman is no stranger to the North. She has travelled by canoe in the far reaches of northern Manitoba and Saskatchewan and arrived from the east well equipped to carry out her venture.

The party brought in four caribou, two bobcats in addition to snowshoes, traps, fish nets and tackle, dogs and camp equipment. Cold Lake is a settlement at the railroad, 100 miles northwest of The Pas.

INSISTS DEAD MAY BE RESTORED TO NORMAL

BERKELEY, Cal., Oct. 31.—Restoration of life and normal mentality to persons who have been clinically dead for as long as 30 minutes is held to be possible, under certain circumstances, by Dr. Robert E. Cornish, revivification experimenter.

The young Berkeley scientist, whose experiments with dogs have been widely noted, expressed this belief Friday in commenting on the statement of Dr. Velyien E. Henderson, University of Toronto physiologist, that the restoration of life to persons dead of certain causes was remarkable only in the case the patient did not become an idiot.

"Sometimes when a person is exposed to a low concentration of carbon monoxide for an extended period the brain is subjected to slow asphyxia and insanity results, even while heart and breathing have not stopped at all," Dr. Cornish said.

"On the other hand, exposure for a short time to a large amount of carbon monoxide may stop breathing, but if proper treatment is quickly available, complete recovery is possible.

"Theories of Dr. Randall Henderson of Yale have resulted in wide use of a mixture of carbon dioxide and oxygen injected into the blood to displace the carbon monoxide before permanent cell damage occurs."

Canada Part of British Empire

(C. P. Cable) (By Guardian's Special Wire)

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Canada's High Commissioner to Great Britain, Hon. C. Howard Ferguson, said tonight Canada is ready to take part with Great Britain in leadership of world affairs.

Addressing the annual dinner of the City of London Wholesale Linen Trade Association, Mr. Ferguson said the British Empire which was going to control world affairs. He was cheered by the members as he concluded his speech.

"I came here believing that in world affairs the settlement of difficulties depends upon leadership," said the former Ontario Conservative Premier. "History has shown that the country which can lead the world better than any other is Britain."

"Dealing with trade relations between Canada and the United Kingdom, he said a new relationship had been created within the Empire and in Canada there was the strongest desire to increase trade with Britain and find a permanent basis for constant interchange of goods.

Hon. Cyrus McMillan Addresses Woman's Club

OTTAWA, Oct. 30.—There has never been a time in the history of Canada when it was so necessary to consider the course over which we have gone, and to examine the sign-posts pointing to the future, Hon. Cyrus McMillan, of McGill University, told the Ottawa Women's Club, when he was the speaker at their luncheon Monday in the Chateau Laurier.

Dr. Macdonald was introduced by his former colleague, Dr. G. S. Whitby, a distinguished educationist, and head of the department of English literature in McGill University. His subject was "A Canadian Viewpoint."

The year just closing was one of anniversaries, Dr. McMillan told his audience, one of the most important of which was the seventieth anniversary of the gathering of Canadian statesmen in Charlottetown, out of which Confederation was evolved.

Through the wreckage of the past 30 years, the basis of the Canadian Government, retained the same planks evolved at the Charlottetown meeting.

"Never has there been a country that has made such progress as Canada," Dr. McMillan stated.

"There has never been a stopping place in our national life, though the pace may have been slow at times. In recent years however, the rock of individual development and initiative, to which our fathers clung, has been obstructed with oratory. But despite the general talk of depression, the world is not half so broken as one as it was in 1914 or 1925. To my mind the greatest menace to the youth leaving the university now, is forgetting the forces that have guided us for 70 years."

The vote of thanks to the speaker was moved by Mrs. Edgar D. Hardy, and extended to him by the president, Mrs. G. Scott Murray.

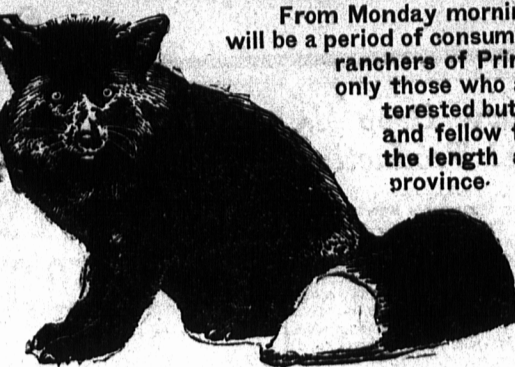
