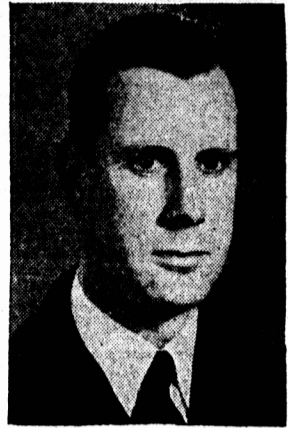

C. N. R. Counsel For Atlantic Region



MONTREAL, Dec. 6—J. W. Graham Macdougall, O.B.E., solicitor for the Canadian National Railways at Montreal, has been appointed regional counsel for the Atlantic Region. It was announced here today by N. J. MacMillan, general counsel for the company. Mr. Macdougall will make his headquarters at Moncton, N. B., succeeds W. H. Jost who has resigned from the C. N. R. to become a partner in the law firm of Burchell, Smith, Jost, Meagher and Burchell at Halifax.

A native of Sydney, N. S., and graduate of Dalhousie Law School in 1940, Mr. Macdougall has had a distinguished war service. He served as intelligence staff officer in England, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany, attaining the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, and held the appointment of Chief Counter Intelligence Staff Officer, at Headquarters of the First Canadian Army, when the war ended. He joined the Canadian National System upon retirement from the Army.

MONTREAL, Dec. 7—(CP)—Receipts on the two Montreal livestock markets today were 101 cattle, 44 calves, 190 sheep and lambs and 213 hogs.

Trading was slow to start today and prices were steady with yesterday's. Heifers of common to good quality were 9-20. Good cows brought 15.50-17.50; medium kinds 13.50-16 and common butchers were 12-13.50. Canners and cutter cows were 9-11.50. Common quality bulls ranged from 12-16. A few good western calves were sold at 24. Grassers were ranging from 13-16.

Most of the lambs sold from 23-24. Sheep were 5-10. Grade A hogs were selling at 31.25 with sows 27 dressed.
