Witness Testifies Offered Bribe To Burn Buildings

AMHERST, N. S., May 16—Testimony that George Langille had offered me \$100 to burn the buildings was given by Percy Langille, nephew of the accused, as the trial of George E. Langille, charged with counselling to arson in connection with a fire last year that destroyed the Burnham and Morrell lobster plant at Saddle Island, off the Malagash coast, opened in Supreme Court today.

Charles Corkum told the court he had set the fire, using gasoline and straw as fuel. I got fifteen dollars from Percy Langille, who told me that this was all the money George had on him, he testified.

Corkum had previously been convicted of arson in a lower court, and is now awaiting sentence.

Several of today's witnesses testified that George Langille had been seeking a lease to the Saddle Island plant, demanding that Clarence Kennedy, present holder of the lease, be "put off the island."

Both George and Percy Langille are charged with counselling to arson. Four thousand lobster traps, a quantity of lobster traps, nine buildings and a wharf were destroyed in the blaze.

U. S. Polo Team Defeats Britons

NEW YORK, May 16—(CP)—A 37-goal United States polo team led by veteran Tommy Hitchcock today defeated a 29-goal British and United States combination 8-5 as trials continued for the International cup series starting June 4.

Mike Phipps was unable to play with Hitchcock's team because of a sprained wrist, so the 40-goal "dream team" could not take the field as a unit. Ehrhridge Gerry, a seven-goal player, took Phipps' place alongside Cecil Smith and Hitchcock, with Stewart, Ingelhart as back, Hesketh Hughes and John Lakin, British substitute players, and Winston Guest and Raymond Guest made up the losing team.

Hockey Deal Is Reported

NEW YORK, May 16—(CP)—Manager Red Dutton of New York Americans revealed today he had "all but completed" a player deal with Toronto Maple Leafs but declined to announce details until President Frank Calder of the Canadian Hockey League has formally closed the transaction with his signature.

Red, who promised a week ago there would be several new faces on the 1938-39 edition of the Americans, said the deal had been discussed with Conny Smythe of the Toronto Club during the League's annual meeting in Boston last week.

He promised the eventual announcement of the player transfer would be "big news," but declined to state whether the man concerned was a forward, defence player or goaltender. The announcement, he added, might be expected around June 1.
