June 4, at Waltham, Mass., Leslie Young, formerly of Pownal lost his life by drowning. A Waltham paper thus describes the sad event:—A sad drowning accident occurred in the river at the Nutting boat-house float about 6 o'clock last evening when Leslie I. Young, aged 21 years, of 221 Lowell Street, lost his life while swimming. Though there was a number of men in the locality at the time, none were able to rescue the young man, for he gave no outcry, and did not reappear after diving into the water from the float. The body was recovered after a half hour, and turned over to undertakers, Coolidge and Strauch. It was examined by medical Examiner West, who reported death due to accidental drowning. The fact that the young man did not appear on the surface seems to indicate he was seized with heart trouble when, in a heated condition, he plunged into the river. James Burgen and John Darling were soon on the scene, and after groping around on the bottom of the river and diving for about 20 minutes they brought the body to the surface. Dr. Frederick MacDonald and officers, William J. Kenery and Richard McDermott worked over the body for a half-hour but all efforts to revive Young proved fruitless. Leslie I. Young has resided here in the past few years, and he was in the employ of the Prudential Life Insurance Co., as an agent. He is survived by his father and mother; two brothers, Charles W. and Fred S. and two sisters, Miss Clara and Mrs. Dan. Matheson. He was a member of Gov. Give Lodge, I. O. O. F. Young had been in his canoe, and he was in company with Clarence Freeman, who was preparing his boat for a trip up river. He put on his bathing suit and plunged into the river from the float, immediately when he went into the water he gave a smothered cry and sank, after which he did not reappear. Mr. Young was popular with his associates, and was highly regarded by the management at the Prudential office. To the bereaved family the sympathy of many acquaintances is extended in their hour of sorrow.

On motion of Mr. Donald McKinnon, Mr. Bruce D. Howatt, student-at-law in the office of Messrs McKinnon and McLean was admitted as an attorney and called to the Bar.

The Chief Justice, addressing the Grand Jury reviewed the evidence in the four criminal cases pointing out the seriousness of interfering with police officers in the discharge of their duty. The officers he maintained instead of being interfered with should be upheld and encouraged in every way in the carrying out of their work.

His Lordship pointed out that in all the cases before the court the offences could be traced to the results of intoxicating liquor. He severely denounced the "boot-leggers" or procurers, idle able bodied young men who make it their business to lie in wait for the unwary and rob them. These "human wolves" should be rounded up and severely dealt with, if the illicit traffic in liquor is to be effectively controlled.

The Grand Jury begs leave to report that they have visited the Hospital for the insane, and found everything in a very satisfactory condition.

They examined the goods in store and found them good. We were informed by the doctor in charge that the number of patients were 140 men and 136 women.

They also visited the Infirmary and found everything clean and sanitary, with 81 inmates.

The tuberculosis Cottage was also visited and found a very desirable place for patients of this kind.

The management of these institutions reflects great credit on those in charge.

The Jail was also inspected and they are pleased to report only one prisoner therein. Everything was satisfactory and well kept.
