

BALLOON'S HARD FIGHT IN SNOWSTORM

GOTHA, Germany, Nov. 17—The dirigible balloon Parseval III, while proceeding to Bitterfeld yesterday, was compelled to land after several hours of hard fighting against a snowstorm, in which it was impossible to see in which direction it was heading. The stability plane and several steel wires attached to the gondola were broken. The vessel has been entirely deflated and will be transported to its destination by train.

MILL MACHINIST SERIOUSLY INJURED

FREDERICTON, Nov. 17—Alfred Marshall, head machinist at the Canadian Colored Cotton Company's mill at Marysville, fell twenty feet from the top of the boiler house, while working on the installation of new boilers last night. He suffered a fracture of the base of the skull and will probably die. Three physicians have been working with the injured man and they do not hold out any hope of his recovery. Early this afternoon a telephone message from Marysville stated that Mr Marshall was still living.

STEAMER CALVIN AUSTIN IS UNDERGOING REPAIRS.

ST JOHN, Nov. 17—The steamer Calvin Austin of the Eastern Steamship Co is undergoing repairs at Boston and being put in first class shape for winter service. Her boilers have been removed, so that a new bed may be made and other general repairs are also being effected. She will come on the line again Dec 20, at which time the single trip service on the International division of the line between Boston Portland and St John, N. B. will go into effect. At the same time the steamer Governor Cobb will be withdrawn from the route, having been chartered for the winter to run between Florida ports and Cuba.

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STUMP AND TORCHLIGHT SUFFRAGETTE PARADES

REV GERTRUDE VON PETZOLD.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 17—For the first time in the history of the mid-west women will take "the stump" in behalf of woman's suffrage this fall in Iowa. The Rev Gertrude von Petzold, pastor of the First Unitarian church, who recently came here from London, and is a genuine English suffragette, will be one of the chieftains to direct the movement.

The purpose of this speaking campaign is to effect a legislative favorable to a suffrage amendment to the state constitution. When the women appeared before the legislature last winter they were shamefully treated, so they declare, and now they propose to make a hard fight.

"We will 'stump,' as you Americans say, every county in the state, declared the Rev Gertrude von Petzold. "We will endeavor to reach every corner and neck of Iowa, and it will not be our fault if the voters of this state do not hear our side of the case. A feature of our campaign will be torchlight parades. In England this is a common sight, and has proven of great aid in securing audiences."



RUSSIA RESTRICTS JEW LAW STUDENTS.

ST PETERSBURG, Nov. 17—Because of the great number of Jews, who have entered the legal profession since 1905, the Minister of Justice has further limited the percentage of Jewish students, who may be eligible for admission to the bar. Hereafter but 35 percent of these living within the pale, that is, within the Russian district where may reside only such Jews as have been admitted by special favor of the Government, will be eligible.

STREET CAR KILLS NOTED TENNIS PLAYER.

CHICAGO, Nov. 17—Kreich Collins, a famous tennis player, was killed by a street car last night. He was run over while crossing the street. Collins had the western championship almost continuously from 1897 to 1906. Collins lost the western championships to Nat Emerson of Cincinnati in 1907 and since then has taken no part in tournament play because of the weakness of his eyes.

WHEAT FROM FAR NORTH.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17—Wheat grown at Fort Liard has been received by the trade and commerce department from Commissioner Perry, of the North West Mounted Police. Fort Liard, on the river Liard, lies two hundred miles north of the 60 parallel of latitude and twenty miles east of the Yukon Territory. The grain was graded as No. 2 Northern, worth about ninety-four cents a bushel.
