BANKRUPT'S LOOT LOST FROM LINER—LONDON, July 21.—Before the Common Serjeant (Sir Henry Dickson, K. C.) at the Central Criminal Court yesterday, Harry Erdman, 37 timber merchant, and Abraham Jacob Stanley, 37, merchant, pleaded "Guilty" to a charge of conspiring to defeat the provisions of the Bankruptcy Act, 1914. Erdman was charged with having, within six months before the presentation of a bankruptcy petition against him, quitted England with £29,450, which by law ought to have been divided among his creditors. Mr. H. D. Roope, for the Crown, said the defendants had carried on business in partnership, and in 1919 shipped quantities of goods to America, on which they obtained advances from their banks. During April, 1920, their financial position became acute and it occurred to them that a way out of their difficulties would be for Erdman to proceed to the United States, taking with him a large sum of money to pay off the advances, and sell the goods. With the help of Stanley, Erdman collected in a portable form approximately £30,000 and went to New York, but instead of proceeding to "lift" the funds, he spent £100 there and returned to Liverpool by the Cunard liner. After the ship had left New York, he discovered that the suitcase containing the £30,000 was missing and complained to the Cunard Company. The prosecution was unable to prove that his story was a fabrication. Mr. Comyns Carr, for Erdman, said that before he left England he communicated his intentions to some of his creditors. There could be no question that the suitcase was lost. The Cunard Company's porters gave a receipt for certain suitcases, and was receipt was for one more than was delivered on the boat. Sir Henry Curtis Bennett, K. C., who, with Mr. J. A. C. Keyes, appeared for Stanley, urged that he had only played a minor part in the transactions. The Common Serjeant said he would deal leniently with the defendants. He sentenced Erdman to

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three months' imprisonment in the second division, and bound Stanley over in £100 to come up for judgment if called upon.

CHARMS OF ALEXANDER AND MARIE

Alexander, a king of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes whose recent marriage to Princess Marie of Rumania aroused so much public interest by a very interesting personality. He was born in exile, and was the second son of Prince Karageorgievitch and of Princess Zorka, daughter of Prince Nicholas of Montenegro, and there seemed little likelihood of his ever ascending the Serbian throne.

Educated in France

His infancy was spent at the Court of his maternal grandfather at Cetinje, his boyhood at a French school at Geneva followed by entering the famous Corps des Pages in Petrograd, for the sons of Russian noblemen. It was from there in June, 1903 at the age of 15, he was summoned to Belgrade by his father, on being elected King of Serbia. He made his first public appearance abroad at the Coronation of King George and Queen Mary, when he was the youngest foreign royalty in the procession.

Upon becoming Crown Prince when his elder brother, Prince George relinquished his rights of succession to the Serbian throne, he devoted himself to affairs of state, even at an early age showing discretion and tact, firmness and foresight, when dealing with situations of difficulty. In 1911 owing to his father's ill health he assumed the regency.

Royal Love Match

Somewhat serious, with a smile that is sweet though rare, King Alexander possesses great personal charm. His busy life has left him little time for athletic games, but he is a good shot and a fine horseman, and is devoted to animals. His favorite indoor recreation is chess. His honeymoon was to be the first holiday he has had for many years. Romance surrounds the meeting of King Alexander with Princess Marie of Rumania. Before the great war had brought sorrow and suffering to Europe, the Royal couple had met in the beautiful hills of Sinai. Later Prince Alexander, as prospective bridegroom, never tired of dilating on the charms and beauty of Queen Elizabeth's lovely daughter. Seven long sorrowful years elapsed, now to be submerged by happiness sanctified by past suffering, and the future devoted to safeguarding their subjects.

Marie's Beauty and Charm

Princess Marie in addition to possessing beauty and brains,

the young Rumanian, English, French and Russian, fluently and has learnt Serbian for which her knowledge of Russian has been of considerable assistance. She is domesticated and fully alive to the responsibilities of a wife and mother. Naturally of a gay and gracious disposition, happiness radiates at her approach.

Her school days, spent near Ascot, made her an adept at all English games. She has had a very interesting and representative training for ceremonial enacting her English born mother, the Queen of Rumania, a grand daughter of Queen Victoria at public functions.

CAN A NEGRO BLUSH?
