Presbytery Meeting At Cardigan

On Tuesday, the twenty-seventh instant, at half past seven in the evening the Prince Edward Island Presbytery met in special session in Cardigan Church. Owing to the absence of the Moderator, the Rev. A. J. McNeill was appointed Moderator pro tem and Rev. J. A. McLellan of Valleyfield was appointed clerk. In addition to these there were present Rev. D. McGowan, Georgetown; Rev. E. M. Aitken, Cavendish; Rev. W. E. A'tken, Dundas; Rev. G. A. Grant, Orwell; Rev. B. H. Penwarden, Mount Stewart; Rev. E. Lockhart, Souris; Rev. W. O. Mulligan, Charlottetown; Rev. G. C. Taylor, Charlottetown; Rev. John Stirling, Bradabane; Rev. R. H. Staver, Hunter River; Rev. M. J. MacPherson, Hampton; Rev. M. J. MacPherson, Cardigan; Rev. A. S. Stewart, Montague.

Messrs. Isaac Beers and Malcolm Nicholson, representative elders from Montague and Bradabane respectively were also present.

One important matter was the consideration of a call from Montague to Rev. John Stirling. This call was before the Presbytery a couple of weeks ago and the congregation of Bradabane duly cited to appear for their interests before this special meeting of Presbytery. Commissioners from Montague, consisting of Rev. A. S. Stewart, Isaac Beers and D. L. MacKinnon were heard urging the acceptance of the call, while Messrs. N. Mathieson, D. MacDonald, and Neil Macdonald from Rose Valley, Hugh MacKay, Bradabane, W. J. Seaman, Elder and Malcolm Nicholson, Elder and hear, all of whom spoke in favor of retaining their pastor. On the call being placed in Mr. Stirling's hands he asked for time for consideration as he was undecided what to do. Presbytery granted him one month if necessary to make his decision.

Provisional arrangements for his induction were made in the event of his acceptance of the call. The Moderator of Presbytery Rev. Geo. Miller of New London was appointed to preside and induct, Rev. B. H. Penwarden to preach, Rev. J. M. McLeod to address the minister and Rev. J. A. MacLellan the people. The time for such induction service was left with the Moderator and clerk to arrange in detail.

A conference was held with the Cardigan congregation, on matters affecting the welfare of its work. The delegates and members of Presbytery were most hospitably entertained in the homes of the kind people of this prosperous and modern village so beautifully situated by the salt water. It would be difficult to find in this lovely Province of the Dominion a more delightful spot where fishing, bathing, boating and camping could be better enjoyed. The Haunted Valley

Mr. McLachlan estimates the average season of navigation into Port Nelson at two months; that is between the actual docking of the first ship and the departure of the last. He submitted an estimate he had based on the rates at that day showing that the rate on grain from Saskatchewan to Liverpool via Port William and Montreal was 26.4 cents per bushel. It would have cost 13.9 per bushel to haul the grain from Saskatoon to Port Nelson including handling charges, leaving a margin of 6.5 for the ocean rate, extra insurance and interest on the cost of work. The average rates obtained by tramp steamers carrying grain from Montreal to Liverpool was seven cents. The engineer points out that tramp steamers would inevitably choose the Montreal route unless there was a considerably higher margin to induce them to go to Port Nelson. Liners, he says, could never successfully run into Port Nelson but could package freight be handled in large quantities.

Excessive Costs

Mr. McLachlan was of the opinion that it would always cost twice as much to handle cargoes at Port Nelson as it would at Port William or Montreal.

"I have no longer any hesitation on the east coast but they are as in saying that the Hudson Bay Railway is doomed to certain failure." Mr. McLachlan goes on to say, "There may be fish in Hudson Bay but there is no fishing season. There may be minerals on the east coast but they are as inaccessible from Halifax as from Port Nelson. There is nothing for the Hudson Bay route north of Split Lake, so long as the St. Lawrence route is available.
