HENS PAY.—A gentleman in this city has a flock of 16 Plymouth Rocks which are more than paying for their keep. During the month of December the flock as a starter for the winter's work, contributed two dozen eggs to the family's larder. In January they made an extra effort and for the month averaged half a dozen eggs a day. Encouraged by their success they went to work in earnest and are now laying an average of a dozen a day, which means a cash contribution of \$5.50 to the weekly revenue. These hens have no special privileges, their house being a somewhat dilapidated and none too warm, outhouse with more or less restricted yard room which they make but little use of in the cold weather. They are given a mixed grain feed morning and evening with boiled potatoes and bread swish at noon. A little alfalfa meal occasionally is all the green feed they get. The success of the little flock under the conditions proves very conclusively that any one with a moderately comfortable outhouse and a little yard room could, if they would, supply their own homes at least, and a small corner of the market, with eggs and so add to the world supply of food.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 9.—Thousands of war prisoners are starving in Russia as a result of disorganization of transportation. It was declared today, Russian officials admitted their fear of an uprising.

Commissioner of Prisons Mentzky said he would "decline to take the consequences" arising from the serious situation. Efforts to move supplies to the prison camps or transport prisoners to points where food stuffs have been stored have failed through lack of train facilities.

ARCHBISHOP BRUCHESI ISSUES PASTORAL LETTER

MONTREAL, Feb. 9.—In a pastoral issued by Archbishop Bruchesi to the clergy of his diocese he adds his influence to that of the secular authorities in urging economy in these trying times, but from motives he states, higher than merely human considerations. On all the Sundays of Lent flesh meat is allowed at all meals, and on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, except the Saturday of Ember-Week, flesh meat is allowed at the principal meal. The law which forbade the use of fish and flesh meat at the same meal on the days when the use of flesh meat was allowed is abrogated.

APPAM CASE SETTLED

NORFOLK, VA., Feb. 9.—A final decree was filed in federal court here yesterday in the case of the British steamer Appam, captured in the Atlantic by the German raider Moewe, and brought to Hampton Roads by Lieutenant Hans Berg and a German prize crew. The court previously had awarded the ship and her cargo to the owners, the British & African Steamship Company, and today's action finally disposes of the litigation.

The court today ordered that the costs of the case, totalling \$4,447.55, be deducted from the residue of funds belonging to Berg and the Imperial German government, consisting of cash captured on the Appam and Moewe deposited with the court during the litigation. This sum, \$327,768.86, less the costs, was ordered placed to the credit of the alien property custodian.

WILL REDUCE RATIONS OF HOME FORCES

LONDON, Feb. 9.—The Earl of Derby, Secretary for War, today notified Field Marshal Viscount French, commander of the home forces, of his decision to reduce the rations of meat, sugar and tea for all the home forces except youths under nineteen years training for abroad.

"When the whole nation is being asked to reduce food consumption in the interests of our armies abroad," says the War Secretary. "I think you will agree with me that the army will expect equally to be asked to make certain sacrifices. The burden cannot be allowed to fall wholly on workmen and children and civilian workers."

He explains that the reduced ration compares favourably with the field ration of meat of most other armies and says that the reasons for making the reduction imperative are known to all, adding:

"The fate of the war may well depend upon the spirit in which such reductions are accepted. The grit of every individual soldier and civilian is now being tested and may be still further tested during the coming months. It is the duty of the army at home to set the whole nation an example of determination and cheerfulness, and I have no doubt of their response."

HUN BRUTALITY TO PRISONERS

LONDON, February 11.—Reuter's has received copies of a carefully verified sworn statement from British soldiers returning from the German prison camps and hospitals regarding systematic brutality practised by the Germans upon Italian prisoners. These reports come from over a dozen different parts of Germany and are confirmed by independent testimony. Reports are of recent origin; soldiers who gave testimony left Germany only recently.

FOOD CONTROLLER'S POTATO QUOTATIONS

BOLSHEVIKI GAINING SUPPORT OF YOUNG COSSACKS.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 9.—Former Premier Kerensky has been ordered "exiled" by Gen. Kaledine, hetman of the Don Cossacks, according to reports received here today. Further breaks in the ranks of the factions opposing the Bolsheviki were reported.

Generals Kaledines and Alexieff, former war minister Sazhikov, although apparently uniting in organizing an army to oppose the Bolsheviki government, are said to be on the verge of a split. The old and young Cossacks are drifting apart, and are reported to be facing an armed clash. The Bolsheviki are gaining the support of the young Cossacks.

Bolsheviki victories over the Ukrainians are reported. A number of stations and positions in the vicinity of Postoff have been taken by the former. An artillery battle is raging between Backmuck and Nieschin, in which the Bolsheviki are employing 200 big guns. The Ukrainians are reported to have retreated, after blowing up a bridge across the Dnieper. The commander at Paetheuro was captured and sentenced to death. Battles between Bolsheviki forces, Polish are continuing.

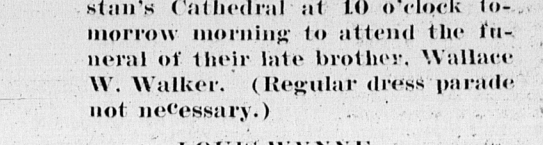
