LYNCHING IN ANARCHY.

The Atlanta Constitution under the above caption comments upon how far and fast the spirit of anarchy is spreading in the United States. Not many years ago the victims were confined to men guilty of horrible outrages and murders of women and children. Now assaults, robbery, stealing as well as the graver crimes are enough to congregate a mob and cause a popular hanging or burning. Not long ago the lynching horror was a sectional one. Now it has spread to much wider bounds and has become a menace to the good order and civilized procedure of the nation at large. 'The whole fabric of our civilization totters on an insecure base,' says the Constitution, 'when every arm and sovereignty is broken through by irrational, irresponsible and bloody minded mobs.' A leading New York Journal the other day referring to the lynching at Wilmington said: 'The mob gloating over the details of the negro's revolting confession, deliberately roasting him and struggling for pieces of his clothing or his body for souvenirs, were as savage as the primitive Fiji Islanders. To complete the job they should have not only roasted but eaten their prey.'

The number of these barbarities, the blood thirsty spirit displayed by the mobs, the altogether horrible character of the proceedings and the now widespread and widening area over which they occur gives to the mind of the peaceful and orderly Canadian reader an impression that a large section of the United States is given up to anarchy. These horrors have been accumulating for years, apparently in increasing ratio. The year 1903 is as yet but half spent, yet in that period more than twenty lynchings of negroes have been recorded in the United States press. The list of states in which they occurred includes Louisiana (3) Florida (3) Georgia (2), West Virginia, Mississippi (4) Missouri, Texas, Illinois, (2) Wyoming, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Tennessee. In some of these cases there were two or more victims at the same lynching, and there was from one to four lynchings in each of the states just named. A glance at the map will show that the area covered by this blood madness extends from the states bordering on the Gulf of Mexico northward to the latitude of the great lakes, and from the Atlantic ocean to the Rocky Mountains. is no longer an evidence of sectional anarchy; it has become national. The time was when lynching was reprobated by the northern press as a crime peculiar to the south. But Delaware, Wyoming and the great states of Pennsylvania and Illinois are not in the south. The epidemic of blood has infected north and south, east and west, with a difference of degree only. This form of anarchy does not exist in British countries. It is hardly known in any civilized country except the United States. There it is horrifying to many millions of the better classes as it is to us. It is condemned by the better portion of the press north and south. But the slavery in a past generation, it finds its advocates and defenders in the pulpits, among those who preach the Gospel and the Golden Rule. The Republic feels the disgrace but is powerless to purge itself therefrom. It seems even powerless to limit or isolate the crime against law and order, which is yearly spreading to wider areas, farther north and east and west. What will the end be? Is there not some danger, with the rapid influx of settlers from the south that Canada may become infected? For lawlessness like plague or cholera is infectious and it is a menace to Canada that we are placed in 'contiguity' and in constant intercourse with the one land where the fury of mobs perpetually sets law and order at defiance.

This is from the Sydney Post and speaks for itself: Ten young men on their way to Dorchester penitentiary from Cape Breton County, as a result of over indulgence in liquor is a powerful temperance sermon. Ten young men in the prime of life surrounded by cold, cheerless prison walls, for a term of years is a tale calculated to melt the hardest heart. It is little wonder that Judge Hittoble took occasion to do some temperance lecturing.
