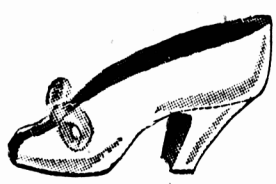

Rev. Fr. Feehan Celebrate First Mass

(Saskatoon Star Phoenix)

Following recent ordination to the priesthood at Woodstock, Ont., the Rev. Edward Gratian Feehan celebrated his first Solemn High Mass in St. Mary's Catholic Church Sunday, Dec. 29.

The church was filled to capacity for the service at which Archbishop Gerald Murray, Winnipeg, former bishop of Saskatoon diocese, gave the sermon.

Father Feehan, a son of Edward Daniel Feehan, superintendent of separate schools in the city, and Mrs. Feehan, was born in Regina, but came to Saskatoon at an early age and obtained most of his education at St. Mary's School and Bedford Road Collegiate. He was ordained Sunday, December 22, by Bishop John C. Oody at Woodstock and said his first Mass Christmas Day at St. Paul's Hospital Chapel.

Assisting Father Feehan in the service Sunday were the Rev. M. Donovan as deacon and the Rev. P. Skaluba as sub-deacon. The Rev. Father Collison was master of ceremonies. His three younger brothers, Ned, Bernard and Leo assisted altar boys. Bishop Pocock, Saskatoon, was in attendance as were the Rev. G. Ehnman, vice-provincial of the Redemptist Order, and the Rev. Xavier Benning, sub-prior, St. Peter's Abbey, Muenster. The choir of children from St. Mary's School was under the direction of Rev. Sister Gertrude de Sione.

A banquet was tendered in Father Feehan's honor at one o'clock Sunday afternoon in St. Paul's Hospital Nurses' Home with the Rev. Leo Sexsmith, pastor of St. Mary's Church, as toastmaster. Special words of welcome were given by Bishop Pocock.

At a reception which followed hundreds of visitors called to tender congratulations to the newly ordained priest. Prominent among the tokens received was a purse presented on behalf of the parishioners of St. Mary's by Joseph Cooney. Solemn benediction in St. Mary's Church in the evening concluded the day's proceedings. (Mr. E. D. Feehan, father of Rev. E. G. Feehan, attended Yankton's University and received his primary schooling at St. Margarets, P.E.I.)

Memoriam

MR. PETER MARTIN GRANT

The death occurred in the P. E. Island Hospital on Jan. 6th, of Peter Martin Grant, Mr. Grant was born in the year 1873, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Grant year 1890 he entered Prince of Wales College having won a King's County Scholarship and two years later graduated with the Governor General's silver medal, the highest award at that time. He taught in several schools in this Province before going West and finally made his home in Vancouver.

At the outbreak of World War No. 1 he enlisted in the Sixteenth Seaforth Highlanders and in front of Ypres in one of the worst battles of the war in May 1915 was wounded and taken prisoner to Germany where he remained till the end of hostilities.

Since then Mr. Grant made several trips to his Island home, the last one was in the spring of 1945. He spent some time with his brothers and sisters in Boston on his way East and was only here a short while when he suffered a stroke and entered the P. E. Island Hospital for treatment. From this he never recovered, but his mind remained bright and he did much reading, never complained and was always in hopes of being able to go back to Vancouver but on the above date he took another stroke and passed away.

Mr. Grant never married, he is survived by two sisters and five brothers, Roderick in Bangor, Mrs. L. J. Bishop, Mrs. Colin Thomas and Duncan in Everett, Mass., Donald in Boston, Alexander and George in Central Railway.

The funeral was held on Thursday from the Bangor Church to the adjoining cemetery, service being conducted by the Rev. V. MacPherson of St. Peter's.

BUTCHER INTRODUCED SUCCULENT GOLDEYE

VANCOUVER, Jan. 13 — (CP) — Coming goldie in — was first introduced to the world by Robert Firth, it is the belief of Fred Selfred of Vancouver.

Mr. Selfred said that his research indicates that the original smoking process used on goldieye was used by Firth, an English butcher who came to Canada in 1896.

Firth, Mrs. Selfred's grandfather, caught the fish in the Red River near Winnipeg at night when his meat market was closed. The smoking process proved so satisfactory that he decided to commercialize the venture.

Selfred said that when Firth died in 1940, he was considered king of Canadian fish smoke, having spent more than 40 years in the business.

Mrs. Frank Mitchell was organizer for the evening. The chairman, Mr. Roland Easton, presented the following programme:

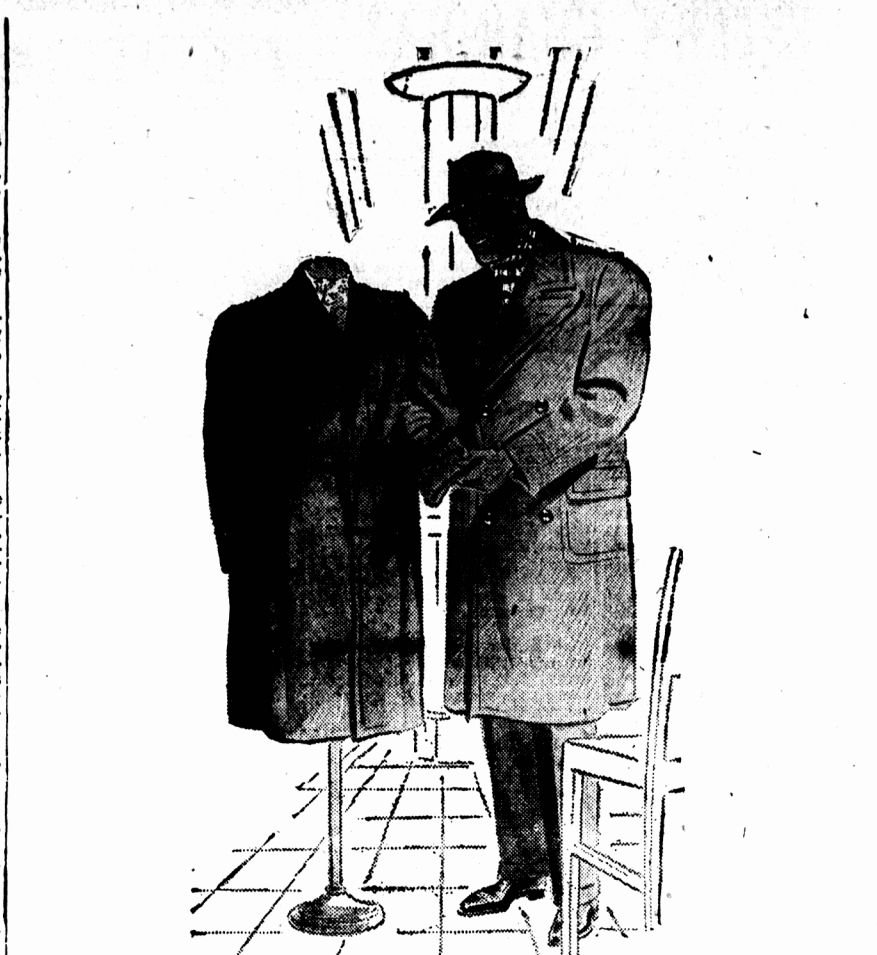

DEPUTY MINISTER TO RETIRE OTTAWA, Jan. 13 — (CP) — Herberg F. Gordon, deputy minister for air since 1944, has been placed on leave pending his retirement next June when he reaches the age of 65. Defence Minister Claxton announced today. The announcement made no mention of a successor.
