ABEGWEITS' EVEN SERIES WITH WOLVERINES

"Rookies" Lead Local Squad To Sparkling Win

Harry Currie Is Star Of Game With Coal And Assist To His Credit. Referee Roy Prowse Forced To Seek Police Protection After Over-ruling Assistant During Closing Minutes Of Setto.

HALIFAX, Feb. 6.—Threatened by irate fans Referee Roy Prowse of Charlottetown left the Halifax Forum tonight under police protection for the third game of the championship of the Maritime Hockey League. As a result of tonight's game the teams are now on even footing for the title that leads to Allan Cup playdowns, each having won one game and tied one.

Prowse incurred the hatred of the Halifaxians by over-ruling a decision of his assistant, Spud Beazley of Dartmouth, who had penalized Harry Currie of Charlottetown just after the Abbies had taken their 3-2 lead near the end of the game. Beazley claimed Currie had tripped Owen Lennon of the Wolves, but Prowse said the Wolverine player had fallen over the back of the young Islander.

After a long dispute during which Beazley clutched the puck and threatened to refuse no longer and the Wolves refused to play, the chief referee had his way and the game continued with Currie on the ice. At one point, Prowse got a new puck and was going to make a one-sided call.

Nearly all the players went into the fray with chips on their shoulders at the beginning. If they missed the puck, they rarely missed their man and questionable tactics were employed throughout. Out of the maze of high sticks, felled play and many penalties of the first period, the Wolverines emerged with the first goal near the half-way mark. Charlie Lawlor scored on his own rebound after Currie had passed out from corner with only seven players on the ice. Near the end of the period, Harry Currie evened it up for the Abbies. After a scoreless second period, Steele and Nicholson each scored for the Islanders in the third while Ron Hudson was hitting the Wolverines' other mar-

The young Abbie recruits filling the gap left by players who departed for the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association rullings bore the brunt of the Island attacks tonight. With Charlie Kane missing from the front line, Harry Currie filled his place well alongside his namesake Frank and Hickey. Nicholson, scoring his first goal in the first period on a mixup in front of Daddy Barber when Ernie Moser was off, and assisting Nicholson in the final minutes of the game. Nicholson's winning shot slipped through Barber's legs after the young defender had passed out from a corner. After Walter Lawlor drew the defence, he sent a perfect pass to Steele who had an easy job scoring the Abbies' second goal as he coasted in. Less than two minutes later, however, Ron Hudson evened it up again when he took up Owen Lennon's rebound, drew Sargeant neatly and slid the puck into the goal. Nicholson's goal was scored seven minutes after that. Although the Wolverines' outshot the Abbies 11 to 13, most of their goals were from far out and Leo Sargeant turned in a sparkling performance in goal, stopping several dangerous rushes. The Wolverine back for the most part depended on individual sorties.

The crowd could not be managed. Prowse over-ruled Beazley at the end of the game. A broom was hurled at the Charlottetown referee three times. The last time it was added to the fans' fury by being a net-side face-off to the Abbies blue-line.

As the game ended, Prowse rushed for the exit with Ernie Moser chasing him, his stick held over his head. The Wolverine centre, however, was held back just as he left the ice, by manager John Bonn.

The whole audience rushed after the referee. However, he made the rink office, and became safe behind locked door while the crowd passed around waiting for him to come out. Police reinforcements were called, and after a struggle managed to clear the front lobby of the rink. The crowd however refused to be disbanded and hung around outside. Prowse finally got away through an alley made by lines of police leading to a waiting taxi. Angry shouts and hisses followed him, but nobody dared to touch him through the police line.
