SOME LEAF DISEASES

The leaves of wheat and barley plants are subject to a large number of different diseases which often seriously reduce the value of the crop. The Division of Botany, Dominion Experimental Farms Branch, draws attention to these diseases, so that they may be recognized and proper control used if serious outbreaks occur.

Spot blotch on wheat and barley is the result of an infection of the plant by a fungus. Oblong, dark brown spots, surrounded by a yellowish halo, are characteristic of the disease. The fungus may cause a root-rot or seed discoloration. The sowing of infected seed results in seedling blight. This disease is very prevalent.

Net blotch is found chiefly on barley. The symptoms on the leaves resemble those of spot blotch, but if the spots are examined closely a network of darker lines may be seen in the darkened diseased areas.

Leaf stripe is confined to barley. The disease is characterized by narrow brown streaks on the leaves. As the leaves wither a fraying occurs. No heads, or at most a few, are formed. This disease is different from "false stripe" in which grain-bearing heads are formed and fraying of the leaves does not occur.

As these diseases hibernate on seed, plant debris, or in the soil, control is difficult. Treatment of the seed with Ceresan destroys the fungus. Diseased stubble and straw should be burned. A crop rotation in which sweet clover is included is advisable. Where the crop tends to grow rank, a light seeding is essential to prevent rapid spread of these diseases.

SUMMER CARE DAIRY COWS

(Experimental Farms Note)
The summer presents fewer problems in the proper care of dairy cows than does the winter, if the necessary precautions are taken to insure a continuous supply of suitable feed. Less labour is entailed in caring for dairy cows in summer, but the comfort of the animals should not be neglected, if satisfactory returns are to be expected. A constant supply of fresh water should be available and the animals should have access to salt regularly, when flies are numerous, spraying the cows at milking time with a good fly repellent is profit-

Hold Anniversary Of United Church

BRITISH COLUMBIA AND NEWFOUNDLAND COMMENCE EARLY—LAYMEN ARE ACTIVE.

TORONTO, May 29 — The first beginnings of the Tenth Anniversary of the United Church of Canada were witnessed in Vancouver, B. C., when the British Columbia Conference and Provincial Young People's Convention together attended a pageant of union. In the outposts of Newfoundland the anniversary services have been held early in order that the fishermen might take part before starting out on the season's work. In Toronto

one of the largest and strongest churches, Timothy Eaton Memorial, has also observed the anniversary ahead of schedule.

While the days set for the celebrations are June 9th and 10th, many congregations of the United Church of Canada are already well organized for the occasion. In Oxford County, Ontario, a visitation of all the churches by 25 to 30 laymen began on Sunday, May 19, and continues on May 26 and June 2. One or two laymen are visiting each congregation. On June 9 a special order of service will be used and a Thank-offering taken.

In Middlesex and other Presbyteries of London Conference anniversary committees have been formed and are at work. In Middlesex two delegates from each committee of Presbytery form the com-

mittee, with Dr. D. C. MacGregor of London as chairman.

The Saskatchewan committee has issued an encouraging letter containing this statement: "With 78,000 more communicant members, 58,000 more Sunday school members and 99,000 more young people's society members than in 1924, surely our labours are not in vain in the Lord and we have every cause for thanksgiving."

All the Prairie provinces have organized for the Tenth Anniversary and Thank-offering. Similarly, the Maritime Provinces are preparing. It was stated yesterday that the Presbyteries in Ontario and Quebec have been in communication with their congregations and that the activities of Toronto churches are being matched in provincial centres.

Ashes of Ribbons For Anzac Field

SYDNEY, May 29—Ten thousand ribbons have been recently burned in Sydney. They were sanctified by the tears of women in all parts of Australia. Some came from humble folk, others from wealthy, but each ribbon was a link with one of 60,000 Australian soldiers who never came back.

Gathered from countless wreaths which, though the post-war years, had been placed on the Sydney Cenotaph, they had been carefully preserved. On Anzac Day the ashes of the ribbons were to be scattered on the battle-heights of Gallipoli.
