## Quick Action By Mother Saves Burning Home

A Charlottetown sports writer turned firefighter at Rose Valley Wednesday after the quick action of Mrs. William Matheson saved her home from destruction by fire.

Mrs. Matheson and her family of small children were going about their customary tasks in the house when one of the smaller children ran downstairs under the bed and cried out, tearfully: "Mamma the house is on fire."

Undaunted by her apparent more or less helplessness to cope with the situation, Mrs. Matheson quickly dispatched one of her children for her husband, who with a son was working in the woods more than a mile away, sent another to a neighbor's home a quarter of a mile away to sound an alarm and marshalled the others in an effort to remove bed clothing and other wearing apparel while she rushed upstairs and endeavored to keep the flames under control by throwing water on them from a pail.

## Receives Long Service Medal

Major W.G. Darke of Brookfield, P. E. I., had received the long service officer's decoration medal from the militia department. It was learned yesterday.

Major Darke enlisted in No. 5 Company, second regiment, in December, 1922, under Lieutenant Colonel MacLeod of Hunter River, P. E. I. He attended the first militia camp on the Island at Milton in 1923 and also at Hunter River the following year.

He qualified in musketry at a special camp of instruction under Lord Dundonald at Sussex, N. B., in 1924 and was musketry instructor for the 82nd Regiment for the camp of 1925. He was also appointed on the camp staff as musketry instructor for 1926.

Major Darke took the course in infantry at Fredericton, N.B. from January 1 to March 31, 1926, winning first class honors. He was appointed provisional lieutenant in 1927 and was promoted to senior lieutenant in 1929.

During the absence of the late Captain J. A. MacDonald in South Africa, Major Darke filled the rank of adjutant of the 82nd Regiment for the camps of 1929 and 1930.

He succeeded to the command of E Company at Brookfield on the retirement of Captain Angus Beaton. He continued in command until the reorganization of the 106th Battalion at the close of the year, retiring in 1932 with the rank of brevet major after 40 years of continuous service in the militia of this province.

Major Darke is a brother of Joseph R. Darke, a well-known athlete, formerly of Charlottetown but now a resident of Providence, R. I.



## In Memoriam

CAPTAIN WM. TOOKER, R.N.

Many of our older citizens will regret to learn of the death of Captain William Tooker, R.N., on April 12th inst. in Vancouver, B.C., aged 93.

Captain Tooker and his family lived for a number of years in Charlottetown where they made many friends. His earliest years were passed in the regular Royal Navy service. The greater part of his life, however, he was engaged in hydrographical survey work.

His first undertaking was a survey of the coastline of northwestern Australia. From there the Admiralty sent him to Canada.

Summer after summer he sailed from this port in the S.S. "Gulnare" and later in S.S. "Elmore" for the coast of Labrador and Newfoundland.

Capt. T. G. Taylor of this city served as sailing master with him for many years.

About the year 1910 the Canadian Government took over this coastal survey from the British Admiralty.

On retiring from this service Captain Tooker moved with his family to Cowichan, B. C., where they resided for a number of years. Later he moved to Victoria, B. C., and after the death of his only daughter Miss Nora Tooker he moved to Vancouver.

He is survived by his widow, who now lives in Vancouver. His eldest son Noel was killed in the Great War. His son Guy resides in Vancouver, and Hugh in Calgary.
