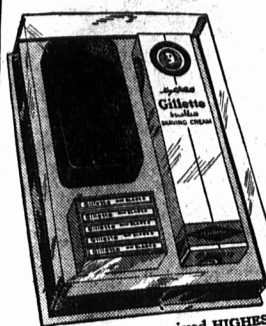

CHICAGO, Dec. 13-(AP)—Santa Claus will be in the dog house if he doesn't pack along a big rain or snow to break a severe plains drought. Most of the area needs moisture for stock and the coming crop season.

The fall season has been almost rainless in the old dust bowl of western Kansas, eastern Colorado and the Oklahoma Panhandle where the dry spell is most severe. Most serious, threatened are the winter wheat belt and the stock country, much winter wheat in western Kansas and western Nebraska failed to germinate in the dry soil. The grain which sprouted is dying from lack of moisture.

Russia Rejects League Proposal To Mediate

GENEVA, Dec. 12-(CP)—Russia tonight rejected a League of Nations proposal to mediate the Russian-Finnish war, opening the way for league condemnation of the Soviet Union as an aggressor and possible expulsion from Geneva. The rejection came in the form of a telegram from the Soviet premier and foreign commissar, Vyacheslav Molotov, to Joseph A. C. Avenol, secretary-general of the League, in reply to a diplomatic "invitation" to Russia to take part in proposed League mediation resulting from Finland's appeal to Geneva. "The government of Soviet Russia thanks you, Mr. Chairman, for your kind invitation to take part in discussion of the Finnish question," Molotov's telegram said. "At the same time the government of the U. S. R. brings to your attention the fact that it can not accept this invitation for reasons outlined in its telegram of Dec. 4, sent in response to M. Avenol's communication."

Says Appeal Unfounded

In his previous communication Molotov said Russia considered Finland's appeal "unfounded," that she did not consider herself a state at war with Finland, that Moscow was maintaining "peaceful relations" with the Soviet-sponsored Communist-headed Finnish "people's government," and that the regular Helsinki government had "resigned its powers" and was not authorized to make representations on behalf of the League. Molotov's telegram tonight arrived more than three hours after expiration of a "deadline" set by the League for a reply. In its reception on the eve of Argentina's scheduled formal demand for Russia's election from the League increased the odds that the action would be taken. The Soviet action automatically killed league efforts at mediation. Jakob Shturik, Soviet ambassador to Paris and Moscow's representative here, received the Soviet reply at his hotel an hour after it had been communicated to the League. He received no separate communication from his government.

No Surprise

Finland representatives commented that it was "no surprise." (Havas News Agency said today that Soviet sources in Geneva indicated Russia will break off relations with France and Great Britain if she is expelled from the League of Nations. (An Associated Press correspondent quoted French sources as indicating, however, that the Paris government is contemplating breaking off relations with Moscow, with which it signed a mutual assistance pact May 3, 1935, when Soviet and French troops aimed at forcing "an iron ring" around the Reich, through a series of such treaties. The pact was reaffirmed by France and Russia May 18, 1937.)

Death Of Mr. J. A. Smallman At S'ide

Citizens of Summerside were shocked and grieved yesterday to learn that Mr. John A. Smallman had passed away quietly at his home on Summer Street. Mr. Smallman had been in failing health for the last two years but his death came suddenly at the age of 57. He was very well on Sunday but was up and about yesterday morning. He took a sudden weak turn and died almost immediately.

Mr. Smallman was one of Summerside's most well-known and beloved citizens who will be missed by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. Mr. Smallman was born at Knutsford, O'Leary in 1870 and was the son of Joshua and Elizabeth Ryan, a Quaker. He came to Summerside in 1894, where he entered the firm of Sinclair and Stewart as salesman. When the late Melinclair, founder of the firm, retired in 1908, Mr. Smallman became a member and director of the firm of Sinclair and Stewart, which he held until his retirement from active service five years ago.

Mr. Smallman was always most courteous and obliging at all times and his business integrity and outstanding personality the firm owes in a large measure its success, particularly in its earlier years. Mr. Molotov was held in the highest respect and regard by his fellow directors and staff and also by the firm's many customers. Mr. Smallman was a member of the Baptist Church and for many years held the office of deacon and church clerk. He was a member of the board of governors of the local college for over 20 years, and was also a valued member of the Summerside School board for 20 years. His name in all things that pertained to the advancement of the community. Fraternally Mr. Smallman was a member of Prince Edward Lodges No. 22, O. O. F. and No. 10, F. O. C.

In Mr. Smallman's Summerside has lost an outstanding citizen and one who will always be remembered for his kindness and devotion to duty. His death is a heavy loss to an affectionate husband and father, his wife, formerly Henrietta Baker, his son, Mr. William Smallman, councilor of the Summerside town council and one daughter, Cassie, Mrs. Hume Hoggard of St. John, N. B., also two brothers, Mr. Edgar Smallman, a government official, and James Smallman, O'Leary and one sister, Mrs. Robert Horner, Bloomfield, also two grandchildren John and Margaret, all of whom much sympathy is extended. The funeral will take place on Friday afternoon at two o'clock.
