COLUMBUS, Miss., Sept. 14—(Special)
In a duel with shot guns
eight miles from here Rev. F.
M. Young Halse, aged 49 years,
shot Sam Harris in the stomach and the
life of the man is despaired of.

THE MINISTER IN JAIL.

Young Halse is also wounded. The
cause of the fight is not known. The
minister is in jail.

THE ROYAL BANK CHOSEN.

MONTREAL, Sept. 14—(Special)—The
Royal Bank of Canada has been chosen
for the task of distributing to the Cuban
war veterans \$31,000,000 in connection
with the recent war.

A LONG AUTOMOBILE TOUR.

CALGARY, N. W. T., September 11.
—The Golden automobile world tour
ing party, driving in their motor car
upon the tracks of the Soo, Pacific and
Canadian Pacific railways, Minneapolis
to Vancouver, reached here last night
from Maple Creek, a distance of two
hundred and forty miles, making a two
day drive upon the tracks of the
hundred and sixty-one miles, and in
the world's tour in eleven countries,
upon the highways, of nineteen thou-
sand and four hundred and twenty-one
miles, having been upon the road one
hundred and sixty-two days.

EMPIRE POSTAL ORDERS.

LONDON, Sept. 10.—Arrangements have
been made to exchange postal orders be-
tween Great Britain and Newfoundland.
The arrangements will go into opera-
tion on the 14th inst.

\$40,000.

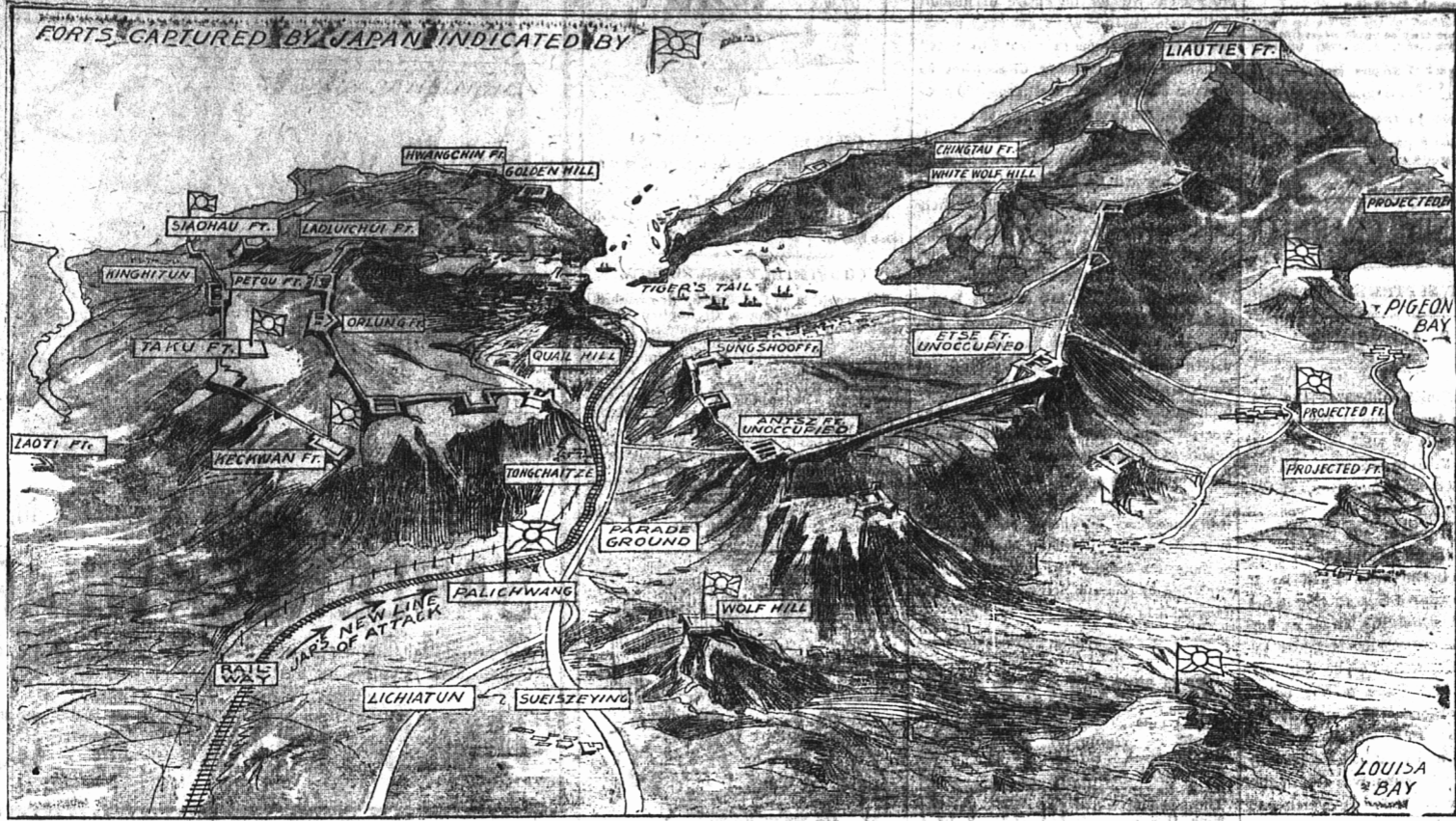

lottetown might long enjoy its benefits.

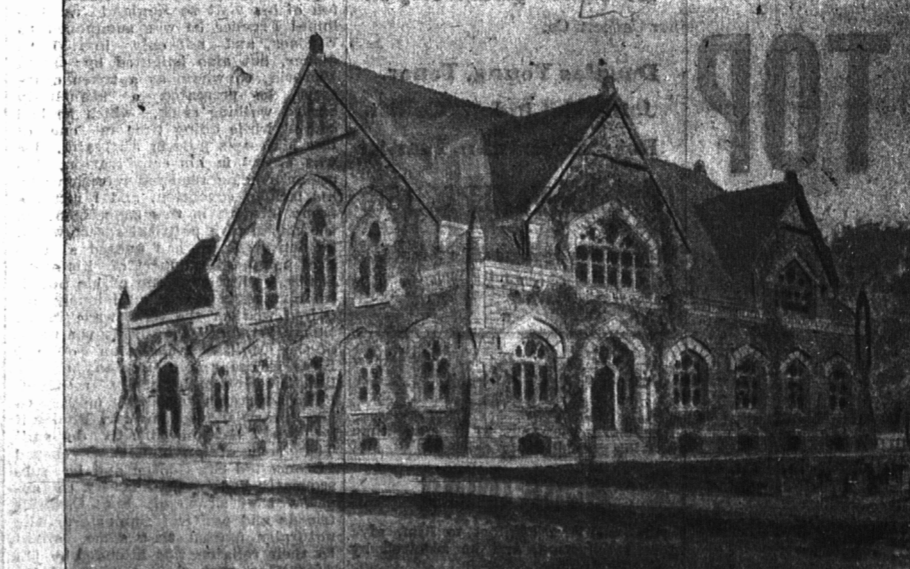
Premier Peters spoke with pride of

POSITION OF HOSTILE ARMIES

Russians Fortifying Tieling—More Fighting
Port Arthur—Russian Losses at Liao
Yang—British Steamer Released by
Prize Court—Another Russian
Ship on the Pacific.

POSITION OF THE ARMIES.

LONDON, Sept. 14—(Special)—There is
no fresh news from the front.
Japanese advices show there is a con-
siderable Russian force south of the Hun
River while the Russians declare the
bulk of the Japanese army is still south of
the Yentai branch railway.

RUSSIANS FORTIFYING.

The Russians are fortifying the heights
in both sides of the Liao River at Tie-
ling, also called Tieling, thirty miles
north of Mukden.

FIGHTING AT PORT ARTHUR.

Russian advices tell of fighting about
Port Arthur on September 1st when the
Japanese were again repulsed.

FOUR DAYS RUSSIAN LOSSES.

The Russian losses at Liao Yang

August 23 to September 5 are figured
at 4,000 killed and 12,000 wounded.

CALCHAS WILL BE RELEASED.

The prize court at Vladivostok has
decided to release the British steamer
Calchas but will detain portions of the
cotton, flour and timber consigned to
Japan.

VOLUNTEER CRUISERS ON PACIFIC.

French advices say the Korean Rus-
sian vessel like the Lena is on the Pacific
may put in at an American port.

LOOKING FOR CONTRABAND.

The Lena, now at San Francisco await-
ing repairs, belongs to the Russian
Volunteer Fleet. These vessels are on
the look-out for vessels carrying contra-
band goods to Japanese ports.
