Value of Good Rifle Shooting Shown in War

Hoggins, Toronto, strongly advocated the cancelling of a clause of the association's constitution which ranks more than 100 years of age may not be included on the Rifle team. 1,200 Chinese Land at Halifax

Anti-Red Propaganda by British Writers

"In spite of the demands of Lloyd George and Premier Millerand of France for a quick settlement, Jugo Slavia backed out for a delayed but permanent settlement, rather than permit an immediate but unsatisfactory compromise which would inevitably lead to future war," said Trumbitch.
