Break Between Hockey Body And Union Seen If Proposals Are Not Met

Pro. Baseball Leagues For Maritimes?

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 17.—Formation of four class "D" professional baseball leagues throughout Nova Scotia was visualized tonight by Judge A. D. Campbell, president of the Cape Breton Colliery League.

Colliery League teams will meet Nov. 24 to discuss the possibility of affiliation with the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues. Such organization would give teams in the circuit a class "D" rating, and the chance of being used as farm clubs for higher class leagues.

President Campbell, who led the Cape Breton circuit through a whirlwind season last summer, revealed plans for two more leagues in Nova Scotia and one in New Brunswick. A group of Saint John sportsmen have already considered possibility of such a league, he said, and should Cape Breton teams decide to play organized ball, the National Association's representatives would explore the New Brunswick section.

The other two Nova Scotia leagues, President Campbell said would be made up of Halifax, Pictou and Colchester clubs and Valley League and Yarmouth entries.

Murphy Defeats Cowboy Hughes

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Nov. 17.—Dr. John Murphy, 192, New York, defeated Cowboy Hughes, 205, Boston in the feature event of a wrestling card here tonight. Murphy took the first fall in 18 seconds, Hughes the second in 29 minutes 43 seconds and Murphy the final in 18 minutes, 52 seconds.

Dick Sampson, 191, Boston, and Jim Spencer, 194, Chicago, drew, one fall each.

Wrestling Win Is Nullified

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Nov. 17.—Athletic commission of Montreal today nullified a wrestling victory scored here last night by Gus Sonnenberg against Cy Williams, the "Tahasse Terror."

Williams was smashed on the jaw by a spectator while he lay on the canvas. Sonnenberg pinned him.

The commission said the referee should have given Williams opportunity to recuperate from this attack.

BASEBALL EXECUTIVE DIES

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Harry M. De Mot, Vice President of the Brooklyn Dodgers baseball club, died today. He was 68. He retired two years ago after a career of half a century as a banker.

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REGINA, Nov. 17.—(CP)—Delegates to the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada turned toward this Prairie city today for the opening Thursday of the 49th annual meeting with stormy consideration of proposed amateur code relaxation in prospect.

Other important matters face the meeting but all are overshadowed by the "four point" proposals of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to permit greater freedom of amateur athletes. A definite break in the hockey body's affiliation with the Union was forecast if the C. A. H. A. insists upon its proposals.

W. A. Fry of Dunnville, Ont., A. U. president, has warned adoption of the amateur-professional proposals would mean Canada's withdrawal from all governed international competition, including the Olympic Games.

Proposed C. A. H. A. amendments would provide professionals in one branch of sport might compete as amateurs in others; athletes might capitalize on their sports ability to obtain legitimate employment; athletes might accept payment from clubs or employers for time lost from work while competing; and amateur and professional teams might play exhibition games within discretion of the National sports body concerned.

The Canadian Amateur Lacrosse Association has approved this program and the Canadian Amateur Basketball Association favors a similar platform.

Most contentious point is expected to be the "broken time" suggestion for payment of athletes for time lost from work. Indication the C. A. H. A. has narrowed its aim in this connection.

Where previously it was believed the Association sought deletion of the clause forbidding payments for broken time, an alternative now is proposed.

The C. A. H. A. alternative would provide no athlete shall receive "any bonus or payment in lieu of loss of time while playing as a member of any club or engaged in any athletic sport or exercise or any consideration whatever for any service as an athlete except expenses."

Previously the clause forbade athletes receiving consideration except actual travelling or hotel expenses. It is presumed a broader definition of "expenses" is sought. All eastern branches of the A. A. U. were reported strongly opposed to major changes in the amateur code. It was indicated however reform is favored in the west.

Seek Completion Of Station Project

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—Construction of a Union Railway terminal in Montreal must await greater improvement in rail revenues but is being given consideration by the Government, Transport Minister C. D. Howe today told a strong delegation from that city. Completion of the \$50,000,000 Canadian National Railway station project started nearly 10 years ago, was the chief recommendation of the delegation.

Betty Taylor Selected As Canada's Best

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) REGINA, Nov. 17.—Betty Taylor, starry Hamilton hurdler and a member of the 1936 Olympic team, was selected Canada's outstanding woman athlete by the Women's Amateur Athletic Federation here today at its annual meeting.

Selection of Miss Taylor was not unanimous. Robina Higgins of Winnipeg who holds three Dominion field titles, and Noel McDonald, of Edmonton's famed Grad's basketball team, were also nominated. Miss Taylor receives the Federation Rose Bowl (formerly the Velma Springstaad Memorial Trophy). The award went to Allison Meagher of Halifax last year.

A change in age limits for women's sports was also approved. For one year branches will eliminate the intermediate class, setting the junior age limit at under 17 years of age. All those over 17 will be classed as seniors.

The trial period was suggested by Ontario and Quebec. Success or failure will be reported back to the W.A.A.F.

Scene of the Dominion championship meet next year was not decided. Winnipeg, Saint John, N. B., and Edmonton made bids but final decision was left to the incoming executive. Location it was believed would be governed by the selection of Empire Games city.

The Federation questioned world records credited to Helen Stephens, Babe Didrikson and L. Koubkova. These, they claim, were struck off by the International Federation but appear in the current list of records.

King's Horse, Beaten In Race

WOLVERHAMPTON, ENGLAND, Nov. 17.—(CP CABLE)—Marconi the first horse to race under the colors and in the name of King Edward VIII failed to live up to expectations today in the two-mile Thornycroft steeplechase.

Marconi, but favorite at 4 to 5, finished 10th in the field of 17. Winner of the chase was Glenfiesh, a 10 to 1 shot, owned by W. Whiteley.

Marconi is a four-year-old gelding. The famous Irish jockey, Danj Morgan, rode him.

Since the death of King George last January the Royal stable had been leased to Lord Derby and horses had run under the colors of members of the Derby family.

The King was not present to see the race.

Hockey Opens In Halifax

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Nov. 17.—Dalhousie University Tigers defeated Halifax Wanderers, their recent football rivals, 5-2 tonight in the opening game of the City Hockey League.

Americans Increase Lead By Defeating Canadiens 5-2; Rangers Trounce Bruins 6-1

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(CP)—Scoring three goals in the last period, New York Americans tonight defeated Montreal Canadiens 5-2 to increase their lead at the top of the Canadian division of the National Hockey League and maintain their undefeated record.

Both sides notched a goal apiece in first and second periods, which were fast and evenly contested. The Montrealers opened up wide in the last frame in an effort to gain the lead but left their defence open for clever American combination plays.

Johnny Gagnon of Canadiens and Tommy Anderson of the Amerks were the first period marksmen. Sweeney Schriener gave the home club the lead early in the second session but George Mantha squared the count 11 minutes later.

Harry Oliver, Lorne Carr and Schriener gave the Amerks their winning margin in the last frame. All seven goals were scored following passing bouts and 10 assists were awarded.

Schriener, last year's leading N. H. L. scorer, notched up four scoring points. Two goals came from the slick-haired marksman's stick, and he was credited with assists on two others.

Anderson's goal came when Gagnon, sprawling into his own net to clear the New Yorker's shot, carried it into the goal after Cude had fallen. It was just a few seconds after Gagnon had converted Morenz perfect passout.

Both second-period goals were notched up on passing plays by the two sets of forwards.

In the third, Canadiens pressed hard, with five forwards up the ice much of the period. Oliver scored on a long lateral pass from Schriener, Carr's goal came on a passing bout with Schriener and Chapman, and Sweeney got the final one after he and Chapman had snatched the puck from a Montreal power-play.

BOSTON, Nov. 17.—(AP)—New York Rangers speedy youngsters out-skated Boston Bruins for a 6-1 victory in a wide open National Hockey League game tonight before 9,000 at Boston Garden.

After a scoreless first period, three of Les Patrick's rookies clinched the game by slamming four counters past goalie Tiny Thompson during the second session. Phil Watson countered twice in less than nine minutes and Neil Colville and Alex Shibicky performed so effectively in bagging singletons they made the action one sided.

The Bruins lone tally came at 11-

36 in the third period when Ray Gelliffe circled the Ranger net and fed a scoring pass to Charlie Sands. The home forces, with five forwards in action then tried to force matters but Shibicky broke away to assist Neil Colville get his second goal. Just before the final bell Lynn Patrick came out of the pack with the puck and rifled a shot from just over the Boston blue line.

Angus McInnis Is Barred From Land Of Soviets

WINNIPEG, Nov. 16.—Angus McInnis, C. C. F. M. P., for Vancouver East, passed through Winnipeg Wednesday, and told for the first time, the story of how he, an ardent Socialist, with sympathies for the Communist party and its aims, was refused admittance to Soviet Russia this Summer.

With his wife, the former Grace Woodworth, daughter of J. S. Woodworth, M. P., Winnipeg North Centre and Dominion leader of the C. C. F., Mr. McInnis left Montreal Aug. 7, 1936. The Canadian Pacific railway had instructions to pick up the necessary visas for his entry into the U. S. S. R. The railway was unable to do so, but Mr. McInnis received a letter from Intourist Soviet agency in charge of tourist traffic, giving him an introduction to Intourist in London. In England Mr. and Mrs. McInnis were told their visas would be ready when they reached Helsinki, Finland. At Stockholm they were given similar assurances by the Soviet consul. In Helsinki the consul, after telephoning Moscow, informed Mr. McInnis the visas had been refused. No reason was given.

Returned to London, he inquired at the Soviet embassy, but officials there refused to make any investigation. Asked if it was known that he was a member of the Canadian Parliament Mr. McInnis said: "Yes, perhaps that's why I was refused."

(Mr. McInnis, M. P., who is a native of Prince Edward Island, visited here during the last Dominion election campaign.)

Fay Coleman Leads Field In Pro Tourney

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) PINEHURST, N. C., Nov. 17.—Fay Coleman, one of the Pacific coast's ranking amateurs, as recently as five years ago, won the qualifying medal of the United States professional golfers' tournament today with a 36-hole aggregate of 143, one under par for the distance, as Walter Hagen, five times former titleholder, failed to qualify for the first time.

The 31-year-old, Culver City, Calif., shot-maker added a 75 today while the veteran Hagen, last year's medalist in Oklahoma City, missed the boat by one stroke. The qualifying limit was 136 and "The Haig" had rounds of 77 and 80.

An old competitive rival and also twice former champion, Leo Diegel of Philadelphia, also took 157 in the two day test, as did Sam Parks, Jr., of Pittsburgh, winner of the 1935 United States open championship; Phil Perkins of Cleveland, former British amateur king, and Joe Turnesa.

Johnny Revolta of Chicago, the defending titleholder; Tony Manero of Greensboro, N. C., the U. S. open king, and Gene Sarazen of Brookfield Centre, Conn., three times former P. G. A. title and winner of the Australian open crown two months ago, were two strokes back of the front-running Coleman with 145's.

English Boxers Will Invade The United States

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Three top-flight English boxers are to begin a United States invasion in the next few weeks, James J. Johnston, Madison Square Garden promoter announced on his return from London today.

Jimmy Walsh, lightweight champion of England, is being brought over for a match with champion Lou Ambers, Jake Kilrain, British welterweight king, is seen as a prospective opponent for the current American champion, while Eddie Phillips, a promising light heavyweight, will challenge the best in the 175-pound division.

With Favor Of Hepburn

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Nov. 17.—Premier Hepburn of Ontario said today he would not oppose a proposal, should one be made through the proper channels, to permit race tracks to open downtown offices, accepting wagers for transfer to the regular mutual wickets at the track.

"It would mean that much illegal betting that now goes on would be brought into the open and, as a result, the revenues of the provinces would be increased by a substantial amount," he said.
Legalization of downtown betting offices was a matter for Dominion authorities, Mr. Hepburn said.

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Braddock-Louis Fight Is Still In Doubtful Stage

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(AP)—No contracts were signed today for a James J. Braddock-Joe Louis fight in Atlantic City, but signs point to something being done, one way or the other, in the next 72 hours.

Herman Taylor, Philadelphia promoter, came to town with \$100,000 in \$10,000 bills which he waved under the nose of Joe Gould, Braddock's manager and declared he was ready to close for the fight then and there.

Gould obtained a three-day delay to see what can be done about ironing out possible legal entanglements.

Taylor and Mike Jacobs, who is to be associated in the promotion had lawyers on hand. They advised the promoters they are running a risk of injunctions and court actions.

During the next three days efforts will be made to win the consent of Madison Square Garden which has Braddock under contract to fight Max Schmeling next June.

Col. John Reed Kilpatrick, President of the Garden, has said that if Louis and Braddock meet in anything but an exhibition match, the Garden will consider his contract violated and may take steps to protect it.

If the Garden will agree to play ball, Jacobs and Taylor are willing to give it a share of the profits of the Atlantic City fight, if any.

James J. Johnston, Garden promoter, who was expected to have plenty to say about the plan was strangely silent on his return from London today.

"Wait and see what happens," he said. "The Commission may spike the whole thing tomorrow."

Caledonia Rugby Team Disbands
