### MAY BLOCKADE

#### MEXICAN PORTS.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 18.—President Wilson and the Cabinet met today and discussed the latest phase of the Mexican situation. Overnight developments apparently brought no change, but keen interest was shown in the organization of the New Mexican Congress. Some officials were inclined to believe that they would heed the warning of the United States and take no action on concessions.

Talk of a blockade of Mexican ports was revived but high officials said such a step had not been determined upon. Many moves are under consideration but foremost advisers of the administration are counselling patience, while the Constitutionalistists pursue their campaign.

The report that Carranza might not need to have the embargo on arms lifted to insure his success, strengthened the conviction of many officials that such a step should be taken only in a remote contingency. Confidence prevailed that the United States might wait a few days for the full effect of the recent constitutionalist victories and for the attitude of foreign Governments to become more emphasized.

**THE BRANT.**—The D. G. S. Brant is engaged around Georgetown in removing the Summer buoys there and placing the Winter navigation marks.

**TEA AND SALE.**—Aprons of all sorts for all purposes at the apron table this afternoon at the tea and sale in St. Paul's Parish Hall. 2756.

**BEING SECURED.**—The government steamer Orestia was yesterday hauled up on the flat alongside the Marine Wharf in order to secure her for the winter.

**BIG SALE OF FOXES.**—It is understood, on reliable authority, that Mr. James C. Tuplin has disposed of the remainder of his stock of foxes, also his name and goodwill, to the big Boston Syndicate who recently purchased eleven pairs of breeders from him.

**SCARCE.**—Foxes of good quality and breeding are becoming exceedingly scarce in the Island market. Agents of the Canada Fox Exchange Investment Co., Ltd., who was recently in the western part of the Island travelling over the country in the interests of his firm, reports that there are very few pairs of foxes now offering.

**BUOY BOAT.**—Yesterday the Government Buoy boat, the Lady Laurier, arrived here from Halifax for the purpose of picking up and bringing into Charlottetown for security the various heavy buoys around the Island coast which are only used during the mild weather seasons. On her way to Charlottetown she picked up the buoys at East Point, Cape Bear, and Indian Rocks, and she leaves today to remove the buoys at West Point, Point du Chene and in the Summerside fairway.

**THE EARL GREY.**—In connection with the preparation of the D. G. S. Earl Grey for the winter mail service between the Island and the mainland, Messrs. Bruce Stewart & Co., Ltd., are at present carrying out a good deal of repair work and overhauling and one or two bigger tasks on the vessel. For instance they have installed a new ash ejector in the engine room, and this is to be tested this week. Then they have overhauled and repaired the circulating pump, and have put in a new range in the kitchen, in connection with which they carried out certain changes in the fittings and disposition of that important department. Also they have the cargo doors under repair.

**P. E. I. SANATORIUM.**—All likelihood of a start being made this season with the building of the sanatorium for the treatment of persons suffering from tuberculosis which is to be erected in this province through the munificence of the Hon. Charles Dalton may be discarded, as it is now evident that this is not possible. This comes about through the delay of the architects in forwarding the specifications for the work according to the plans which were submitted and which were accepted by the Sanatorium Committee with a few changes. The specifications have not yet, as a matter of fact, been received by the Committee; the contractors excusing themselves on the ground of pressure of work. If this delay had not occurred, it is very probable that the work of erecting the building would have been commenced already and certainly the foundations would have been finished this year. As it is now, a Guardian representative learned from Dr. S. R. Jenkins, the chairman of the Committee, the construction of the sanatorium will be started early next Spring, and it is expected that the institution will be ready to receive its first patients by the winter of the same year.

**SALMON IN THE DUNK.**—The heavy freshets of a few weeks ago, occasioned by the continual rains, caused the break of the old Roger's mill dam on the Dunk River, and allowed a large number of salmon to come up the stream some of them as far as Bradabane. It is said to be fifty or sixty years since salmon were seen above Roger's mill. It is feared that few will return to salt water as there are no fishery wardens on this part of the river.—E.

**BANK TROUBLES.**—The former Amherst bank teller of whose arrest in New Orleans, particulars were given in Monday's Guardian, arrived in Amherst on Sunday in the custody of Joseph Condon of the Pinkerton International Detective Agency. He was brought before Justice Casey, says an Amherst exchange, Monday morning and was remanded for his preliminary hearing until Wednesday morning. The shortage for which it is alleged he is responsible, totals \$2500. Bail was provided for him to the amount of \$5000 and it may be said was secured without any trouble as there is considerable sympathy for him on account of his youth and general popularity.

### FARES OF FRESH FISH REACH YARMOUTH.

YARMOUTH, Nov. 19.—The Digby fishing schooner Dorothy G. Snow is in port with a fare consisting of 20,000 pounds of haddock, 20,000 pounds of cod and 5,000 pounds of cod.

The fare was sold to J. W. Sproule, a wide-awake Digby business man who has seen the possibilities in the fresh fish business in Yarmouth and has got in on the ground floor by leasing a part of H. and N. B. Lewis wharf at south end. During the past week the schooner Lavinia B., Capt. Doucette, and the sloop Nora, Captain Doucette, arrived at Salmon River, 46,000 pounds mixed fish, and the latter with 18,000.

The schooner Columbia, Captain Murphy, also arrived at Publico with 31,000 pounds. The steamer Hugh D. left here on Friday morning for Clark's Harbor, where she took on a cargo of 750 quintals of dry and pickled fish for Vinal Haven. She arrived at the latter port Saturday night and arrived back here to-day at noon. This is the first cargo of dry fish which has ever gone to the United States in one of our local towboats.
