The weekly meeting of the Young Men's Guild was held on Thursday evening at 8.30 p. m. with Rev. David Wright presiding. On account of the absence of the secretary Alen MacLeod (merchant), Wm. Mellish (teacher) was appointed recording secretary pro tempore. The minutes of the former meeting were read and adopted. On a ballot being taken, John McPherson, the popular merchant tailor and athlete, was elected "Captain" of the "Montague Baseball Club" in connection with the Y. M. Guild. A committee, (in reference to putting up a fence at the baseball grounds), was appointed as follows: John Sutherland (convener), Brenton Hyndman, Tyler Parkman, Fred Brehaut (Barriester), and Willard Spencer. John B. Poole was appointed to install an electric light in the Guild room. Among those present were: John E. Fraser, W. Campbell, W. H. Gordon, Fulton Campbell, Heath McIntyre, Simon Campbell, George Stewart, Dr. Roy Fraser, and others. The next meeting will be held in the Presbyterian Church at 8.30 p. m. on Thursday next. On Tuesday, the 24th instant (Victoria Day), six young men of Montague narrowly escaped a watery grave, while sailing on the Montague River near Rowley's Wharf. The names of the young men are: Percy Pearson (son of late M. Pearson), Martin Lannigan (clerk at Poole & Thompson's), George Stewart (son of Dan Stewart, saddler), Reinald Doiron (son of Matthew Doiron, carriage painter), Carmen Wightman (son of Rev. F. A. Wightman), and Fulton Campbell (tailor with McPherson Bros). In the forenoon of the 24th, the above mentioned young men left Montague for Georgetown on a pleasure trip with a sailing boat. After they had gone about five miles they turned round for home, as the water was rough and the weather squally for the small boat heavily loaded. A sudden gust however soon upset the boat, which sank, but remained upright. To the mast, which was floating above the surface, some of the young men kept themselves from drowning, while the rest kept swimming and resting alternately around the submerged boat. Fulton Campbell started to swim to the shore, which was about three hundred yards from the scene of the accident, but did not reach it. After an anxious half-hour, when they had almost given up hope of holding out longer on account of the fatigue and cold, a dory was seen to be approaching them. The dory, rowed by the ten-year-old son of Capt. Allan of the schooner "Happy-Go-Lucky," which had been anchored there about a quarter of an hour previously, came to the scene and picked up first Fulton Campbell, who had called that he was about done out with his exertions. Then the remainder of the young men were rescued, some of them being towed after the dory to the shore. Loo Loo.

CHANGES IN C.P.R. STAFF

MONTRBAL, May 29—It was announced today that the position of general freight agent for the Canadian Pacific Railway in Montreal, made vacant through the resignation of S. P. Howard, is to be filled by H. E. MacDonnell, now the general

freight agent of the Atlantic division with headquarters in St. John. Mr. Howard's jurisdiction covered the whole of the territory east of Lake Superior. This territory is now being divided into two parts. Mr. MacDonnell will be the general freight agent for Montreal and the eastern division, and W. S. Elliot, now the

district freight agent at North Bay, will be the general freight agent of the Lake Superior division west of Chalk river. W. B. Bamford, now the district freight agent at London, Ont., is to be transferred to St. John, to take Mr. MacDonnell's place as general freight agent of the Atlantic division.

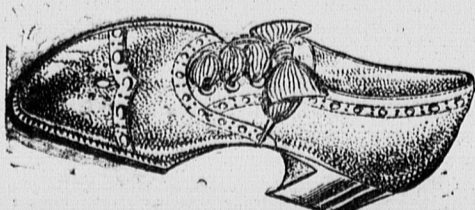
