IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ALEX. ROBBLEE

The news of the death of Mrs. Alex Robblee was learned with deep regret by a wide circle of friends and relatives. Mrs. Robblee, for many years a resident of Tryon, moved a few years ago to Cape Traverse to live with her sister Miss Penze Bell on the old homestead now owned by Mr. Nathan Bell, so her death on March 19th, 1930, took place in the same house in which she was born April 22nd, 1847. Mrs. Robblee was first married to Nathan Leard and lived at Montrose, P. E. I. Of this marriage three daughters survive, Bertha, Mrs. Richard Lord, Tryon; Hattie, Mrs. A. E. Venning, Windsor, Ont.; Maude, Mrs. L. D. Callbeck, Stowia, Sask. She later married Alex. Robblee, by which marriage there were three children, A. N. Robblee, of Layley, Alta.; Penze, Mrs. L. R. Duff, Moosejaw, Sask.; who survive, and Harrison, who died in his youth.

Mrs. Robblee was a woman of charming personality and although never enjoying good health, she kept up active work in church and community. As friend and neighbor she was loyal and generous. In her family life she will live in the memory of her children as a wise and loving mother. During her long life Mrs. Robblee tasted deeply of joy and sorrow, and while her earthly contact with friends and loved ones meant much to her, she relied upon for her comfort, the more satisfying contact with her Master. She was tenderly cared for during her last illness by her daughter, Mrs. Lord, the only member of her family in the province, and by her sister, Miss Penze Bell. The funeral was conducted at Cape Traverse by Rev. A. J. Reynolds, of Bedouque. The cortege then proceeded to the United Church in Tryon, where Rev. G. N. Somers officiated, speaking most feelingly on the subject of "loving kindness." The pall bearers were Messrs. Major Carruthers, Harold Howatt, Harry Webster and Frank McFarlane.

Maritime Provinces Trade Commissioner

Following is a report of the first quarterly report for 1930 of the Maritime Provinces Trade Commission, Toronto:—

The first quarter of the year gives evidence of further progress in the work undertaken by this Commission. New business contacts and contracts have been made between Maritime producers and central Canada purchasers. Tourist information and literature is being distributed. Invitations are being received, not only from Toronto, but other towns and cities throughout the province, for your Commissioner to address various bodies and public meetings in the Maritimes. Ontario people are showing a deeper interest in Maritime Canada and there is also reason to state that Maritime people are showing a keener interest in trade possibilities in Ontario.

ANNUAL MEETING

The first annual meeting of the Commission was held at the Toronto office during the first week in February. Those present were Messrs. Saunders, Ganon, Burchill, Boulter, Beer, LeGallais, LePage, MacPhee and Burnaby of the Board of Control, and Messrs. H. E. Mahon of Halifax, and C. Donald of New Brunswick.

Two full days were spent in receiving reports and considering ways and means of extending the usefulness of the Commission. Through the courtesy of friends of the commission the Annual Report has been printed and mailed to interested parties in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Ontario.

VISIT TO MARITIMES

In March, your Commissioner was invited to attend a conference in Halifax with the Nova Scotia Trade Development Bureau. While there he also had an opportunity of addressing the members of the Nova Scotia Legislature, the Halifax Board of Trade and the Rotary Club. On his return he spent a day in St. John in connection with business under consideration by firms there. Encouraging and pleasing reports of these addresses and conferences, the activities of Messrs. Donald and Mahon the Co-operation of the Nova Scotia Trade Development Bureau, the Halifax and St. John Boards of Trade, the newspapers and business men generally are shown in a new and increasing interest in the trade enquiries developed.

Arrangements are being made by business men in their respective provinces to visit this summer local boards of trade and similar organizations, industrial plants and producers, and to hold public meetings with the object of creating a greater interest in trade expansion and the Marketing of Maritime Products in Central Canada. An invitation has been extended to your commissioner to accompany these men in their survey. It is proposed that a statement of trade enquiries be prepared as well as, wherever practical, samples of products, so that the people may have the advantage of definite information as to the requirements of this market.

Attached to this report are copies of trade enquiries originating from Ontario buyers since February 1st. Mimeographed copies of these trade possibilities have been distributed through Messrs Donald and Mahon to people known to be interested in the particular lines. There are also a few special trade possibilities under negotiation, particulars of which it would not be wise to make public at this time. One of these in particular is progressing most favorably. A New Brunswick firm has made an attractive quotation and samples are now being prepared. The annual requirements of the factory from which the enquiry originated amount to approximately forty-thousand dollars.

LUMBER

On account of the established con-

nections of the larger Maritime lumber firms throughout the Province of Ontario, this commission has confined its efforts in this trade largely to by products such as crating, shooks, boxes, small dimension stock and manufactured or partly manufactured articles. The attached list of enquiries is a fair example of some of the trade possibilities developed. Your commissioner keeps in touch with the long lumber trade endeavoring at all times to push the sale of Maritime lumber. Two representatives of Toronto lumber firms have just returned from buying trips in Eastern Canada. A Maritime firm has recently secured, through its Toronto representatives, an order for over three million feet of lumber to be assembled and milled in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

The potato market in Central Canada is active. Prices are on the upward trend and the demand is good. Few complaints as to the quality of service have been received. One particular instance, however, of a shipper not living up to his bargain is referred to later on in this report.

Some enquiries have been received and there have been several offerings of seed stock.

MISCELLANEOUS

The Ontario market for New Brunswick shingles has fallen off in recent years and is now practically nil. This office has recently succeeded in having one of Ontario's largest buyers of shingles place a trial shipment of a car load. We are pleased to report that the shingles and service were satisfactory. It is hoped that this connection may be a step in the reinstatement of New Brunswick shingles in Ontario. A new line of pickled herring and other varieties of fish is finding a new outlet in this market. Another manufacturer of a well-known factory product who has successfully marketed his goods throughout Western Canada, is now arranging for distribution in this Province.

An interesting connection has been formed with a group of men who are now organizing a Pie Factory. Samples of foxberries have been secured and arrangements are being made for the use of these berries in the manufacture of their pies. Negotiations are progressing in connection with the sale of builders' blank, plaster, maple syrup and sugar, concentrated apple juice and other kindred products, butter boxes, broom and tool handles, apple barrels and heads, etc.

TOURIST

Enquiries for tourist information have started to come in. Some have already made reservations and plans to visit the Provinces-by-the-Sea this summer. Literature maps and general tourist information are in demand and there is reason to believe that 1930 will be the heaviest tourist season yet experienced "down where the cool sea breezes blow."

Arrangements have been made for the display and distribution of literature and information bureaus in Toronto and other parts of the province. Advice has not yet been received from any of the publicity departments of the governments either as to the policy to be adopted or plans for newspaper tourist advertising in this Province.

PUBLICITY

Few movements have enjoyed more general and favorable newspaper support than has the Maritime Provinces Trade Commission. This is particularly true of Maritime newspapers and publications. Ontario and Toronto papers have given generously of news space, and editorials have been favorable and friendly. Requests are frequently received from papers and magazines for articles on the Maritimes. News items and Maritime stories are sent out from time to time and the fact that every one has been published, shows unmistakably the good will of the publishers. E. D. MacPhee, President of the

Maritime Provinces Association has had the privilege of addressing a number of service clubs, churches and public meetings. With the help of films, slides, literature and samples of Maritime products, many people have secured first hand information and a new interest in Maritime Canada has been created.

CANADIAN NATIONAL EXHIBITION

Your Commissioner is pleased to report that New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island have definitely decided to be represented at the Canadian National Exhibition this year. Plans are being made to have this exhibit include more Maritime manufactured articles than were shown last year. The tourist advantages will be given due prominence and everything will be done to interest visitors in Maritime Canada.

COMPLAINTS

It is with much regret, and some hesitation, that this report records a statement of complaints. In large business transactions it is inevitable that occasionally misunderstandings arise and adjustments are necessary. When they are due to misunderstandings or conditions over which there is no control, there is little difficulty in adjustment and continuation of business relationships. On the other hand, complaints such as are recorded here are embarrassing and in some cases have been humiliating to those who are endeavoring to build up markets.

Within the past month Ontario buyers have refused no less than three cars of small dimension softwood, shipped by a Maritime mill. They have also stated that they will not accept further shipments from this plant. The product is not up to specification and upon investigation we are satisfied that the purchaser's complaints are justified. These cars are part of a large contract providing for steady monthly production.

A Maritime lumber merchant recently shipped a car load of stock to a purchaser without first satisfying himself as to the buyer's financial standing. This transaction followed a warning sent out by this office covering the very point. For months your commissioner has been endeavoring to heal some old sores and to interest one of Ontario's largest buyers in Prince Edward Island potatoes. These negotiations resulted in an order which was accepted and confirmed by a Prince Edward Island firm. The price of potatoes went up and the car was never shipped.

Through the agency of this office, arrangements were made with a Maritime manufacturer for the sale of his goods in this market. A trial shipment, consisting of six samples was ordered by one of Canada's largest buyers in this particular line. Every one of the samples was returned as not being up to specification.

Complaints have been received from two purchasers of box shooks, claiming they are not up to specification, and stating that they do not intend to place any further orders with this shipper. This complaint has been investigated and from samples inspected, the buyer's complaint was justified.

A manufacturer quoted a price on a wooden product used in large quantities in this province. The quotation was submitted to the buyer and was satisfactory. The purchaser asked for a sample and after weeks of delay the manufacturer wrote that he could not supply the stock.

While there is a marked improvement in the matter of potato inspection, it is to be regretted that so many complaints should still be received.

Three barrels of apples were sold to a Toronto gentleman who is deeply interested in Maritime industry. According to his letter of complaint only one bushel and ninety apples out of the three barrels were up to standard.

This office is in receipt of a report of a shipment of two hundred barrels of No. 3 Baldwin Apples to the Montreal market. After deducting freight, commission, and other charges their net return to the shipper was

A shipment of ten barrels of a well known Lunenburg County product was received in Toronto in barrels which allowed the pickle to escape. The shipment was a total loss.

Buyers and brokers make frequent complaints on account of the delay in receiving quotations on enquiries. Time and again we had the disappointing experience of finding that the business has been placed before the quotation had been received.

These unfortunate experiences result not only in losses to the shippers, but add to the burdens of those who are endeavoring to find markets for Maritime products, and once more emphasize to producers the importance of maintaining high standards, careful inspection and

business integrity. Once more let it be stated that it is more difficult to regain a market than to find a new one.
