Build Cold Frame Now For Use Fall And Winter



Suggest'on for Fall Use of Cold Frames Every complete garden needs a cold frame. It is a most useful tool, not merely in the spring, but all year around. If you lack this aid to garden success, fall is a good time to build it, and the illustration shows how it may be constructed and put to immediate use for rooting winter flower bulbs, Hyacinths, early tulips, narcissi and daffodils are the principal ones which need a dark, cool situation to encourage early root formation. Bury them in the frame bed in the pots you expect to grow them in, and when roots have developed sufficiently bring them indoors for the quick growth of the tops and blossoms. The frosts of late fall bring to mind problems of harboring perennial seedlings. If you planted them late they will no doubt need some additional protection, and the cold frame will provide it. The best all-around method is to pot the plants, and set them into the frame. Such treatment assures them a few more weeks of growth, and will enable them to benefit from extra warmth in the spring and get an early start.
