HEWSON PLANT SOLD.

AMHERST, Nov. 15.—The real estate, buildings, plant, machinery, etc., of the Hewson Pure Wool Textiles Company was sold at a public auction today for account of the bondholders. For some time past a committee of the bondholders have been receiving deposits of bonds, and although they have been unable to get in touch with all the holders it is understood that they have received upwards of \$225,000 out of the \$350,000 of the bonds in the hands of the public.
 The property was knocked down to E. F. Stevens, of Halifax, the representative of the bondholders, at \$102,000. It is expected that with more time at their disposal, the committee will be able to get into communication with the balance of the bondholders and have them join in a rehabilitation of the enterprise, it being their plan to have all the bondholders come in.
 To-day’s sale marks another step in the plan to operate the property, and business circles the level are naturally pleased to see progress made and look forward hopefully to the time when the plant will be humming again.
 Two insurance policies, payable to the company on the life of H. L. Hewson for five thousand dollars each were bid in by J. B. Douglas for \$1,000 and \$500 respectively. Both policies were subject to loans advanced by the companies in which they were taken out, viz., the Canada Life Insurance Company and New York Life Insurance Company. They were practically sold for their cash surrender value less the loan.

PRINCE EDWARD THEATRE

The piercing cold outside and the warmth and brightness within, combined with the varied selection of vividly depicted screen stories resulted in packed houses at both performances last evening.
 In “Old Offenders,” a one-act drama, an old convict goes to work a scoundrel Joe falsely convicted of a crime. After doing a long stretch Joe returns and finds his daughter affianced to the villain. The wrong of by-gone years is righted in the end.
 A star combination of famous screen artists fill the cast in a four-reel “Master Key” serial, entitled “Heritage.” The age-long problem of the influence of heredity and environment is dealt with in a realistic film drama of American city life. The drunken husband, Mark Fenton, and his wife are portrayed in their slum home, where drink reigns supreme. The birth of the infant daughter costs the mother’s life. Fenton falls a victim to his consuming craving, and the orphan girl, Kate, is left in the care of a kind-hearted neighbour and her burly son, Bill. The girl goes to work in a factory and an accident to Bill brings about a meeting with a wealthy young man and his sister. The sister, a student of sociology decides to test her theories on Kate, and takes her into her home, where the refined and educational influences of a new environment work a complete change. She marries young Melton, who suddenly finds to his dismay, the inherited instincts of his wife’s blood break forth in an uncontrollable fury of temper. The rejected suitor, Bill, with a little skit on the cigarette coupon collecting craze, Wifey objects to Hubby smoking, so he swears off cigarettes. How she becomes a victim to the lure of the coupons and Hubby’s final triumph is convincingly told in a short reel.
 “Yarn Sledge Hammers” tells a yarn of Sophie Clutts and Mustang Pete at the Red Light Hotel in Snakeville. Count Bon Ami finally gets his deserts from the blacksmith with his big hammer. The Count’s sombre-faced valet provides some great fun.
“WATCH ON THE RHINE”
 A century ago was born Carl Wilhelm, composer of the “Watch on the Rhine.” A music teacher of somewhat Bohemian habits, Wilhelm did not set out to write a national anthem, and the “Watch on the Rhine” when sung for the first time as a chorus for male voices in 1854, does not seem to have attracted much attention. It was the war with France which gave it to the status of a national hymn. In 1871 Wilhelm was awarded a small annual pension by the German Government, but lived only to draw it twice.
 The words of the “Watch on the Rhine,” says the Pall Mall Gazette, were written in 1840 by Max Schneckenburger, a Swabian merchant, and seem to have formed his one essay in poetry. At least, he published nothing else of note, and did not live to enjoy the fame of the song in 1870.
