Mr. William Stewart, chairman of the School Board, and to whom a large share of credit for the new school is due, occupied the chair and introduced the different speakers. The programme included short addresses by the following:—Mayor Saunders, Revs. J. C. McLean, C. DeW. White, J. M. Rice, L. A. Ackland, Inspector Boulter and Mr. A. A. Lefurgey, interspersed with patriotic songs and songs from the following resolution from the School Board, moved by Mr. C. E. Strong, and seconded by Mr. Creelman McArthur, was unanimously carried:—Resolved, That the cordial thanks of the School Board and citizens of Summerside be tendered to the Provincial Government for so generously placing at the disposal of the School Trustees the use of two rooms in the Agricultural Building while the new school was in course of construction. What with the sale of the Eastern School and the new school not yet available, it would have been very difficult, if not impossible, for the School Board to provide sufficient accommodation for all the town pupils from the opening of the schools in September until the present time. There is therefore the more reason for appreciating the generous action of the Government in thus relieving a situation that had at one time promised to be embarrassing and difficult to deal with. Further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Honourable Premier Matheson for presentation to his Government. On behalf of the Government Hon. A. E. Arsenault made a suitable reply. The following resolution, moved by Mr. J. LeRoy Holman, seconded by Mr. A. C. Rogers, and responded to by Dr. Jardine in behalf of the Town Council and School Board, was also unanimously passed. Resolved that this representative meeting of citizens, realising the immense improvements made in our school property, that the expenditure although large has been most judiciously appropriated and that the erection of such an up-to-date, sanitary building places Summerside in the very first rank of school properties in the Maritime Provinces, expresses its appreciation and strongly commends the School Board and Town Council for their progressive action.—C.
