Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

ANXIOUS FATHER COMES BACK

Sir,—Permit me a reply to "A Reader" in Friday's Patriot who dissembles the statement about four men falling out to the one at present enlisting to take his place. That statement has been publicly made by many prominent persons and accepted by me as a fair estimate. But as "A Reader" impeaches my motives I will quote a statement made on this point by Mr. Guthrie, Liberal member for South Wellington, Ont., at Hillsburgh, Ont., last week which I hope he will accept.

"Mr. Guthrie gave figures to show the actual recruiting in Canada since the beginning of the month of April last. The figures are as follows: April 5318, May 6406, June 6314 and July 4257 being a total of 22295 in round numbers who had enlisted during the last four months. Upon paper this statement of enlisted men was somewhat misleading. It included about 3800 from the United States and between 9000 and 10000 who had enlisted in railway construction and in forestry battalions. The great need at the front at the present moment is for infantry reinforcements and in the past four months there has only been about 8000 for this branch of the service, while the actual requirements for the support of the four Canadian divisions at the front was not less than 8000 men per month."

That is 2000 per month recruited and 8000 fell out per month, and further "A Reader" gave only casual-

ties, which does not account for all of the losses. These are explanations that "A Reader" did not make. He, however, claims that 60 p. c. of the wounded return again and added to the gross number enlisting he shows that there is a margin of 2000 to the good. So why complain? Let them go back while they last?

But even if 60 p. c. did return then 40 p. c. of the 8000 fall out permanently or 3,200 per month against 2000 enlistments and that process is becoming progressively worse every succeeding month. Besides under training a large p. c. of the enlistments break down making the shortage worse.

But I claim that not only should the four Canadian divisions on the firing line be maintained at full strength, but sufficient in addition should be provided to allow the boys yet living of those who went over first a rest, come home to see their friends for a while and regain strength instead of being compelled to remain there without a let up till killed or the war ends.

This suggestion is apparently not worth considering by "A Reader" who makes his cold brutal calculations that there are men enough.

Observe again that recruiting is ailing off rapidly 6,406 enlistments in May, 4,257 in July, so the end of voluntary enlistment is almost in sight. The election strife will soon complete that job, is it not plain to the dullest that conscription is the only remedy if our boys are to get any relief and Canada do her duty?

The Patriot compares Borden to that monster of Roman History who fiddled when Rome was burning but the men who by fiddling the liberal tunes of politics are preventing our boys getting the fairplay they should have surely show more of the spirit of Nero.

I am not out to defend Borden he has on hand the most serious business ever entrusted to a Premier of Canada and history will give him his true place. The Patriot's placing him in a class with Nero is fortunately for him not the final verdict. The liberal campaign against his character hinders recruiting that is the serious matter at present, and our boys suffer accordingly, that is my complaint.

There is another point in "A Reader's" letter to be observed. He is hedging on the conscription question and claims that the voluntary system, if given a fair chance, would give all the men required. What prevented enlisting here on P. E. I.? No effort or expense was spared, every influence known to the recruiting Committee was used and yet dozens of meetings were fruitless. One issue of the Patriot telling the country that Borden put the boys up to slaughter against German guns with their feet freezing in Canadian boots was a potent hindrance, which living among the country boys I have personal knowledge of.

ALBERTA RICH MANGANESE DIOXIDE.

Deposits Worth \$54,400,00 Already Discovered.

CALGARY.—Worth untold millions of dollars, inexhaustible deposits of manganese dioxide, which is extremely valuable as an iron toughening material and which is in great demand for war munition purposes, have been found in the Cypress Hills in southwest Alberta. Eight hundred thousand tons worth approximately \$54,400,000 have been blocked out by ordinary post hole augers in the last few months and the product is being sold to the British war office for \$68 and \$69 a ton.

The manganese lies on the top of the ground and is very easily developed. James F. Reilly of Montreal, is the engineer in charge and the Hersey and allied interests are said to control the enterprise. Before the news of this discovery leaked out, every foot of the manganese area was secured by insiders. The deposit may, however, extend from the Cypress Hills down to the Sweet Grass hills in Montana and there may be some areas there open to filling.

The Alberta manganese discovery makes the capture of Lens of less moment from an industrial standpoint. Lens contains manganese deposits which have been utilized by the Germans in their munitions making, and with that source of supply shut off, the Allies have been handicapped. The Alberta field, it is said, will fit all the needs and the manganese is being shipped as quickly as the facilities permit.

The 800,000 tons mentioned, were blocked out from the surface and this operation is simple and inexpensive and may be continued almost indefinitely, it is stated.

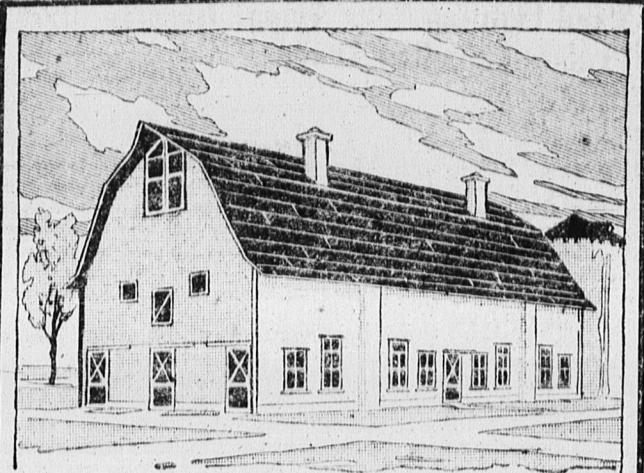
