MONTREAL, March 24—(CP)—Trading attention on the stock market today was largely concentrated on Quebec hydro-electrics, papers and constructions and all groups showed recessions and few gains.

Montreal Power was the bellwether among utilities and, after a feeble and short-lived rally, dropped to a new low. Shawinigan and Quebec Power were also on the downgrade but Gatineau Power and Canada Northern Power put up resistance and finished strong.

Howard Smith was weak in papers and losers in constructions were Desso "B", Canada Cement, Dominion Bridge, Dominion Tar and General Steel Wares. C.P.R. slipped a fraction in rails and Hudson Bay turned backward in mines.

In the miscellaneous list, Imperial Tobacco was fractionally firmer and Celanese common and Wills were slightly down.

FINANCE

NEW YORK, March 24—(AP)—Buying in steels and rails gave the stock market a pivot for a mild rally today.

Ford, in the Canadian section fell back 1-8 points to 9 3-8. Imperial Tobacco, Lake Shore and Walkers showed fractional losses. Dome and International Nickel were steady. The Associated Press 60-stock average at the close was 113 up 1/4 of a point to the approximate level it stood at a month ago.

Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Standard Oil of New Jersey, Texas Corp., American Sugar refining and Great Western Sugar, all up fractions.

Pere Marquette prior preferred spurted 1/4 to 31 1-2 and fractional gains were recorded for Santa Fe, New York Central, Pennsylvania and Southern Railway.

Bethlehem Steel ended 3 1/4 higher at 77 1-2 in face of strike threats against the big arms producer and U.S. Steel 7-8 higher at 56 3-4. Du Pont climbed 1-4 to 147 and American Telephone 1 1/2 up at 162.

A block of 52,000 shares of Commonwealth and Southern, quoted off 1-16 at 1-2, contributed a large slice of the day's volume. Transactions totalled 369,720 shares against 471,680 Friday.

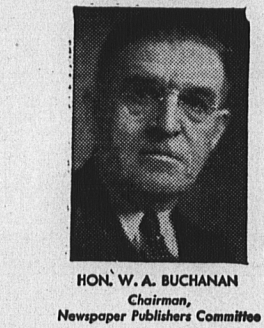

Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, March 24—(CP)—In the second heaviest turnover of the month, stocks advanced today on the Toronto exchange, posting gains for all four index groups. The volume was 220,000 shares.

Paymaster traded 17,500 shares and firming 1-2 to 23 1-2. Slave Lake traded 48,000 shares and gained 1-2 to 12 1-2 and General Forepine firming 3 cents to 15 on a trade of 21,000 shares. Gains of 5 to 10 cents were recorded in the medium-price gold list for Chesterville, Macassa, Pampour, Upp, Canada, Preston and Wright-Hargreaves. Dome and Hollinger improved narrowly.

Steep Rock lived up in the final period and advanced 9 cents to 1.12. Waite-Amulet came through with a 10-cent gain and Noranda added a minor fraction. Other base metals were steady and the group had an index gain of 21 at the close.

Industrials firmed 36 in the index, mainly on the strength of the senior oils, implements and foods. Bear Ash, Twyford, Canada, secured Bishop of Zulund in 1841, transferred to Pretoria in 1902 and Cape Town in 1909.

Currencies

NEW YORK, March 24—(CP)—The Shanghai dollar fell to a new low for the year in relation to the United States dollar in free foreign exchange trading today, declining 1/2 of a cent to a closing quotation of 536 cents.

The Swiss franc and the Argentine peso both gained slightly but other major world currencies closed unchanged.

The pound sterling closed at 44.03 3-4 for open market cables. The Canadian dollar was at 85 (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.00-9.91 per cent discount).

Grain

WINNIPEG, March 24—(CP)—Only minor changes were recorded by futures prices on Winnipeg grain exchange today as both buyers and sellers maintained a cautious attitude. With a fairly strong Chicago display offset by lack of export interest, wheat futures quotations finished 1-8 cent lower, May at 76 7-8 and July 75 1-2 cents a bushel. Argentine values continued their unchanged pace at Buenos Aires.

Livestock

MONTREAL, March 24—(CP)—The Dominion livestock branch reported today that prices for cattle were not established on the two Montreal markets.

Prices on other kinds of livestock were lower. Canners and cutters made \$3.50 to \$4.50. Common cows \$4.75 to \$5.50, medium \$5.50 to \$6 or better, and good cows \$5.50 up. The top cows were not established at the time of writing, and steers were dragsy.

Receipts: cattle, 753; calves, 417; sheep, 63; hogs, 1,804.

Calves were 50 to 75 cents or more lower than the close of the week. Good veals sold up to \$10, with medium kinds from \$8.50 to \$9 and common to just fair quality veals made the bulk of the offerings and these brought \$7 to \$7.75. A few grassers made \$4 to \$5.

Last year's crop lambs were of common quality and made \$8 to \$8.50. Sheep were \$3 to \$8.50. Hog prices were not established and buyers were bidding lower.
