MARMALADES AND WINTER PRESERVES.

Marmalades are made of the pulp and juice of fruits with sugar. The term itself may be traced back to the ancient Greek "melimelon" (sweet apple) and on down to the Portuguese "marmelada." The Spanish marmalade, a delightful confection made of quinces and honey, was a great favorite at the teas so daintily served by early Colonial dames. Another equally delicious conserve made of quinces and honey derives its name from Bar-le-dub, France, where it was made. The creole ladies are also said to be noted for the excellence of their marmalades.

During the winter months when fresh fruit is either hard to obtain or else so expensive that very few households can afford it, the home-made marmalade finds a welcome place on the breakfast table. With its slightly acid taste it serves as a relish or appetizer for those who grow tired of sweet preserves. Orange and grapefruit marmalades are delicious variants for canned fruit and when well made are as delightful in appearance as they are delectable to the palate.

ORANGE MARMALADE

Slice thin two dozen oranges, removing the seeds but not the peel. Shred and seed two lemons and put with them. Measure the juice from them and put with it enough water to make three quarts of liquid, and put this, with the sliced fruit, into a stone crock. Cover this and let it stand all night. In the morning empty the contents of the jar into a preserving kettle, bring slowly to a simmer, and keep the fruit at this until it is tender. Allow a pound of sugar to each pint of juice and cook all together until the peel of the fruit is clean and transparent, then take from the fire, and when it is cool turn it into jars or jelly glasses and seal.

GRAPEFRUIT MARMALADE

Make in the same way as orange marmalade above, but if the grapefruit is very tart you may need more sugar. Use oranges in place of the two lemons.

ORANGE PRESERVES.

Select a number of small medium sized oranges and weigh them. Take their weight in sugar, grate the peel of the oranges slightly and score them around with a knife, taking pains not to let the knife pierce the skin. Put them in cold water for three days, changing the water on them three times each day. At the end of the time tie them loosely in a cloth, put them over the fire in warm water, bring them to a simmer, and cook gently until the skins are tender enough for a pin to penetrate it easily. While they cook put the sugar over the fire with a half pint of water for each pound and boil for five minutes. Strain through a cloth, return to the fire, put the oranges in the syrup, and cook slowly until the syrup is yellow and begins to stiffen. Take a little of it out to cool when you think the right point is reached and see if it jellies. Do not let it be too stiff. If there is not syrup enough to cover the oranges completely, turn them often, that all sides may be cooked evenly. Put into wide mouthed jars and seal while boiling hot.

ORANGE MARMALADE—NO. 2.

Slice nine oranges and six lemons crosswise with a sharp knife as thin as possible, remove seeds, and put in a preserving kettle with four quarts of water. Cover, and let stand thirty six hours; then boil for two hours.

GRAPEFRUIT MARMALADE—NO. 2.

Cut the fruit in halves across the carpeps, and with an orange spoon or fruit knife remove the pulp, the white skin or fibre and about one-half of the white skin itself if you want the desired bitter taste. Shred the skin fine as possible with a sharp knife, weigh skin and pulp, with all the juice, and to every pound allow a pound of sugar and quart of cold water. Cover this fruit with water and let it stand twenty-four hours; then add sugar and simmer for three hours, or longer if you want it thicker. Then fill your jars.

CANDIED ORANGE PEEL.

Cover the peeling with cold water to which a tablespoon of salt has been added for two quarts of water. Let it remain several hours in it, or over night. Next morning drain the water from it and rinse, add cold water to cover well, and put over the fire until it boils. Then pour off the boiling water, cover again with cold, and bring to a boil. Repeat this process until all bitterness is removed. Make a syrup of one pound of sugar to each pound of peel. Boil it gently until the peel looks clear. Then with a fork remove the pieces, place them on platters, dust them with pulverized sugar and dry in the shade. Divide the peeling into quarters, and then cut them into two or more pieces before cooking.

APPLES WITH ORANGE PEEL

This makes a delicious and cheap preserve. Wash and peel half a peck of apples, dropping the peeled apples into cold water to prevent discoloration. Cover the peeling with water and cook to extract the juice and flavor. While they are cooking, cut into the peel a pair of clean scissors the peel of several oranges. Strain the juice from the apple parings, return it to the kettle and add the shredded peel. While this is cooking cut the apples into small pieces, weigh, and to every pound of apples allow three-fourths of a pound of sugar. Add the sugar to the liquid on the stove and when you have a rapidly boiling syrup drop in the apples. Cook until they can be pierced with a straw and are of a rich red color, then bottle and seal.

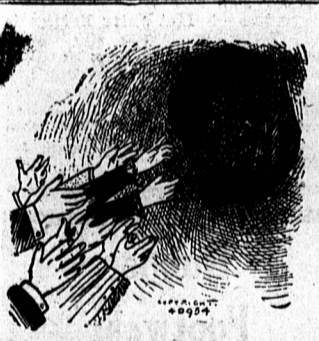
