**New Scheme To Assist British Immigrants**  
 (Special to The Guardian)  
 OTTAWA, Sept. 18.—A further extension of the scope of the scheme of British immigration to Canada was, it was understood arranged last week during the visit here of Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas. By the enlarged plan the new British Government has undertaken to introduce legislation at an early date to provide that the old age pensions and widows allowances now paid by the British treasury to residents in Great Britain will be continued to those beneficiaries when they emigrate to Canada and take their families with them.

Such a scheme, it is stated here, will result in a considerable increase in the inflow of British immigrants under the family plan in that it would enable the heads of families to come. There have been many instances where advantage has not been taken of the family profits through financial inability of heads of families to undertake the move to Canada.

Mr. Thomas did some good coal business when in Ottawa and Montreal. It is believed that in addition to contracts he was able to make with the Canadian Pacific Railway for the purchase of coal, an important contract was also made with Price Bros. the large paper concern. In both cases, it is understood, a very considerable quantity of coal was contracted for.

**Silver Fox Sold For \$605 at New York Fur Sale**

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—Silver fox reached \$605 at today's session of the New York Auction Company's annual fall fur sale, but the whole collection was off 10 percent from the average spring prices. Mink touched forty dollars, with "best sections" off 15 percent and others unchanged. "Best section" red fox was unchanged with others 10 percent lower. Top was \$54. British Columbia marten sold to \$59, but prices generally were off 10 percent. Ermine also dropped 10 percent with a top of \$2.76. Gray fox with a top of \$5.70 showed a similar decline. No advance was shown today although several collections equalled the spring averages. Sales for the first two days reached \$1,150,000. The total estimated value of the offerings is \$4,450,000.

**PREMIER FERGUSSON'S PRE-ELECTION PROMISES**  
 (Special to The Guardian)  
 TORONTO, Sept. 18.—Ontario's seventeenth legislature stands dissolved. The election will be held on Wednesday, Oct. 30th, official nomination day will be Saturday Oct. 19th. Premier Fergusson is appealing to the people, clearly, on the past record, of his administration. In respect of the future he holds out the following pre-election promises: Deduction of passenger motor license marker fees; reduction of the rural power service charge to a maximum of \$2.50 per month, with legislation at the next session to enable the rural customer to borrow upon reasonable terms the money with which to purchase all necessary electrical equipment.

More generous grants to those rural schools which take up fifth class work. Investment of greatly increased sums of money in local roads in every part of the province. Devotion of more attention and more widespread assistance to settlers' roads in the north. Legislation at next session to enable provincial payment of the forecast one cent bounty on iron ore. Various extensions of the Tamiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway. Extension of the probation work of the juvenile court to include adults. Survey of the general welfare of the province by a royal commission already announced. Substantial increase in the province's surplus at the end of the fiscal year, in spite of "the growing extension of provincial undertakings and the payment during the past three years of nearly \$10,000,000 of the debt."

**THE UNSUSPECTED SQUINT**  
 (British United Press)  
 LONDON, Sept. 11.—People with unsuspected squints will have their eyes opened this month when most of the 2,600 members of the Spectacle Makers' Company will meet in London to celebrate the 300th birthday of the organization. How to conquer squints will be demonstrated.

The old-fashioned stereoscope has been elaborated into an ingenious apparatus for this purpose. Instead of the surgeon's knife cutting the muscles of the eye, the nerves themselves are trained until both eyes work together like a good pair of horses.

One new instrument has two tiny lamps which are moved by means of a cord along a rail at the end of the room. By looking at those with a

green glass over one eye and a red one over the other, until the two lamps seem to become one, a possible squint is found easily. On removing the glasses, if the lamps are over each other, you don't squint; if they are not you do.


