OLD PALACE OF THE POPES

PARIS, Feb. 19.—At last it has been decided to turn the old palace of the Popes at Avignon from a barracks to a museum, which will be thrown open to the public. This will be a boon to those visiting the interesting old city on the banks of the Rhone. The troops, chiefly infantry, are under orders to leave the great building. When they are gone it will be thoroughly cleaned and restored. Then the old chapel, the Hall of Conclave, and the various rooms will be reconstituted, and arranged as they were in the time of Gregory XI, the last pope who was at Avignon. This project of converting the palace into a museum is by no means new. It was first proposed by the Emperor Napoleon III, but he had not time to carry it out. The municipality of Avignon will levy an entrance fee on visitors to the museum for the purpose of recovering the outlay on the restoration of the palace.
