MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 2.—The appointment of G. E. Smith, B.Sc., as engineer, right of way, Atlantic Region, Canadian National Railway, vice H. Emmerson, B.Sc., was announced after a long and faithful service, effective September 1st, is announced by Mr. Lancaster, regional chief engineer.

use seed free of this disease. If this is not possible then a portion of the seed should be given to water treatment. In any case a seed plot should be established some distance away from wheat crops and separated by a drop one drill row south.

For 15 acres the following year, drop one drill row south to leave a path for "roguing" and heading time rogue out the smallest plants and place them in a paper bag being careful to discard any chaff. This must be done before flowering as it is at this time that infection takes place.

Iron On Sods Best For Pig Anemia

In view of the fact that the question of how best to administer iron to young pigs is still discussed by several hog raisers, the result of experiments carried out by the Animal Husbandry Division, Experimental Station, Ottawa, in the control of this disease should give helpful.

In experiments in which four treatments with the control of anemia, iron was administered in the form of powdered ferrous sulphate, the ferrous sulphate solution painted on the sow's udders were studied. The weights of the pigs, the mortality from birth to weaning, and tests of the hemoglobin content of the blood were the facts collected. A check lot of pigs received no treatment.

One of the outstanding features of the results was the superiority of the iron on sods. The mortality of the pigs was reduced to 10 per cent, and the weight at weaning was increased 10 per cent. The iron on sods was the best, next to the iron on sods with iron sulphate.

Parasites To Kill Spruce Budworm

An intensified attack on the spruce budworm has been launched by the Division of Entomology, Dominion Department of Agriculture, from its Parasite Laboratory at Belleville, Ont. The Department is distributing tens of thousands of four-winged flies (scintillifera known as Phytodietus furfureus) to prey on the budworm which now infests an estimated 800,000 square miles of Canadian forest, destroying ten million cords of timber annually.

As explained by A. B. Baird, officer in charge of the Belleville Laboratory, an area of Canadian forest as large as Japan is now under attack by the budworm which already has destroyed completely all the blam and 50 to 80 per cent of the white spruce in 25,000 square miles. An additional 45,000 square miles are in immediate danger and more than 183,000 square miles are lightly infested.

Phytodietus, which feeds only on the spruce budworm was found in British Columbia by Canadian entomologists some time ago. In British Columbia Phytodietus was killed up to 80 per cent of budworms in their later larval stages. By bringing this parasite to Eastern Canada, and feeding breeding and huge numbers, a new force is brought to bear on the budworm without interfering with the Eastern budworm parasites. At the present time students are busy gathering Phytodietus in the Fraser Valley, B.C., and after being raised to the pupal stage at a cottage in Lillooet, the parasites are rushed by air to Belleville from where later on they are shipped by air and rail express to the districts most infested—the Spruce Woods Reserve in Manitoba, Black Sturgeon Lake, near Port Arthur, Ont., Forbes Depot and Marwood, P.Q., Green River near Summerside, N.B., and to points in the vicinity of Saranac Lake and Lake

WINTER WHEAT IN ONTARIO

(Experimental Farms News) It is time to plan the seeding of winter wheat this fall states the Cereal Division, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. If wheat is to follow seed, ploughing should commence early enough in order to prevent competition from grasses. Many wheat fields are reduced in yield by heavy growth of timothy or other grasses. Make sure the soil is in good tilth. Winter wheat responds to good fertility and often will benefit by applications of manure or fertilizer.

Use only good seed. Winter wheat seed should be thoroughly cleaned and all shrivelled and diseased seeds removed. Fusarium head blight, commonly known as wheat scab, produces shrivelled kernels which should be removed by a strong blast on the tanning mill. This disease is quite common in areas where corn is produced as it harbours an old corn stock or stubble.

Seed wheat should be treated with Ceresan applied at the rate of 1.2 ounce per bushel or as recommended on the container. This treatment not only controls stink bug smut but will lessen damage from root rots including scab.

Loose smut has been a troublesome disease in winter wheat and it is controlled by ordinary seed treatment. The first aim is to see-
