DEATH OF MR. A. HEANEY.—The death occurred at Clinton yesterday, of Mr. Alfred E. Heaney, a respected member of that community. Deceased was a brother of the Rev. Jacob E. Heaney, pastor of the First Methodist Church. The funeral takes place to-day from his late residence at 3 p. m.

WHOLESALE FINES.—At the Police Court yesterday morning prohibition charges against John McKenna, vendor, George A. B. McDonald and Catherine Oiler were postponed to the 8th. Michael Monaghan was fined \$10 or thirty days; Robert Doyle, \$5 or twenty days; Nelson Whitlock, \$5 or twenty days; Lemuel Maher \$10 or thirty days, each on two charges, Wm. Corish \$10 or thirty days; and H. Saunders \$5—all for having been found drunk in public.

THE PEOPLE'S.—An excellent program of pictures was put on at the People's Theatre last evening. Essanay's dramatic attraction, "The Power of Conscience," which was given in two parts, was the feature of the show. It was an excellent picture, featuring Francis X. Bushman, the famous actor. Two comedy reels were shown, "A Sure Cure" and "Poor Old Mother," both full of fun and laughter. "The Mighty Atom," a Mutual film, was also very good. Altogether the show was an entertaining one and well worth seeing.

LATE DONALD MCKINNON.—The remains of the late Mr. Donald McKinnon, formerly of Colville Road, were brought home Saturday evening from New Bedford where he died on Friday. The deceased was 88 years of age and had been absent from the province for the past twelve years. The funeral will take place from the residence of Mr. John McKinnon, Colville Road tomorrow, Wednesday, at 2 p. m. to Clyde River Cemetery.

ISLANDERS IN \$2,000,000 COMPANY.—Three members of parliament for Prince Edward Island—Senator Benjamin Prowse, Mr. A. A. McLean, member for Queens, and Senator Patrick Murphy, says a Halifax exchange, are among the incorporators of "Golden Windermere Limited," a company which will take over certain reclamation rights on the Columbia River from the City of Golden to Windermere Lake. The company is capitalized at \$2,000,000.

CONFEDERATION CELEBRATION.—A meeting of the Confederation Celebration Committee was held last night when it was decided to place an order for a memorial tablet of either bronze or brass, to be placed in the Legislative Chamber of the province in which the first conference of Confederation was held. A committee consisting of the Premier, Hon. J. A. Matheson, Mavor, Starns, Messrs. Paton, Pope and Major Bartlett, was appointed to arrange a program for the three days of the celebration. Mr. Harold Jenkin was appointed Chairman of a committee, to be nominated by himself, to look after the accommodation of visitors. Messrs W. H. Aitkin and J. P. Gordon were appointed a committee on transportation and to secure the usual special railway rates. Mr. Tidmarsh was authorized to procure a fish exhibit.

THE PRINCE EDWARD.—The announcement that "Jane Eyre," a dramatization of Charlotte Bronte's novel, was to be presented on the screen at the Prince Edward was the means of drawing good houses to the theatre last night. Much was expected of this deeply emotional drama and the production proved equal to all anticipations. It has to be seen to be enjoyed and likely enough, those who did not see it last night, will take advantage of the opportunity offered to-night when it will be put on for the last time. Two more dramas and a roaring comedy made up the picture program. The new vocalist, Miss Ruth Blaisdell, opened her engagement last night with a splendid selection which she sang beautifully. She possesses a sweet soprano voice. Judging from the loud applause she received, she will doubtless be a great inducement that will draw patrons to the Prince Edward.

DELEGATES ARRIVED.—By the express last night there arrived in the city a large number of delegates from New Brunswick to the annual meeting of the Women's Branch of the Methodist Society of the Methodist Church which opens in Heartz Memorial Hall this morning. They were conveyed to their respective quarters by motor cars very kindly placed at their disposal by a number of car-owners—an act of courtesy and kindness greatly appreciated.

VALUABLE EXHIBIT.—Upwards of two thousand persons altogether visited the exhibition at the Municipal Drug Company's store on Saturday night between 8 o'clock and 10 o'clock to see a pair of silver black fox pups which were on exhibition. The toxes are hearty little animals with tiny white tips of tails. They did not seem in any way disconcerted by the piercing gaze of the crowd, but concentrated their attention and efforts on a couple of bones from which they were trying to extract nourishment. An occasional "scrap" between them added interest to the scene. After an exhibition of half an hour they were taken away, as it was considered unsafe to leave them out too long. They are the property of the Canada Fox Exchange and Investment Co., Ltd., and are part of a litter of six. All of the litter have been taken from the mother fox, which is in a delicate condition. This particular pair are being kept in a neat and comfortable wire box and fed on diluted milk and a small quantity of Horlick's malted milk. This compound is given them three times a day. Why plant a tree? Because the birds, "That, 'trance the listening air,'" May nest among its rippling leaves, And sing your praises there.

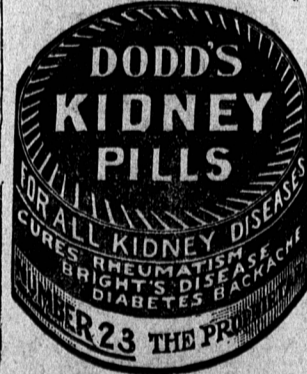
Why plant a tree? 'Cause God Himself, As seasons come and go, May shelter underneath its boughs, And there mute thanks bestow.
