ON EDUCATIONAL TOUR - Rev. A. J. Langley, Secretary of the Maritime Temperance Federation is making a tour of the Maritime Provinces in the interest of his work. He will be on Prince Edward Island for a week. Mr. Langley was guest speaker at a special meeting held on Wednesday, July 9 in the Baptist Hall. In his address he outlined conditions with regard to the liquor traffic in past years and the present day. It was stated that the problem had grown, and bootlegging, consumption, arrests etc., had increased. Mr. Langley urged the fullest cooperation of Christian citizens in helping the Federation combat the evils of the traffic. Members were enrolled and pledges of assistance given. A beautiful solo by Miss Pearl Burns who was accompanied by Miss Brenton, added to the interest of the meeting. Miss Edna Grant, National Field Secretary of the W. C. T. U. was also present, and made a few remarks on the work of the W. C. T. U. On Sunday Mr. Langley will speak in the United Church, Summerside in the morning. This service will be broadcast. He will also be in Tryon and Kensington.

Two-Fold Function "In this Province the function of the Co-operative Union is twofold. One is Co-operative education; the other is supervision (auditing, business advice, etc.) To do a proper job, the Union has to employ more trained personnel to handle its ever increasing load of work. This problem must be tackled and solved when adopting our annual budget for the coming year.

The directors of the Co-operative Union have been greatly concerned over the taxation problem of co-operatives. Individual co-operatives have been advised how to best conduct their business to conform with amendments in War-time Tax Act Mr. J. G. Dennis and myself of the Co-operative Union, Rev. M. E. Francis of St. Dunstan's Extension Department, and Mr. William Hughes of Treasury Department Provincial Government and Mr. Alex. Matheson our legal advisor, attended a special meeting in Quebec City last October on tax problems of Co-operatives. Here problems arising from the new legislation regarding Income Tax on Co-operatives were discussed and much valuable information was obtained on how to conduct our business to conform with the new Income Tax Act.

This information has been passed out to the various co-operatives. It is fitting to recognize the great efforts being put forth by the Co-operative Union of Canada in the taxation field they keep us informed almost daily as to what is happening in the national field of Co-operation through a news letter known as "Co-op Commentary". Through the Co-operative Union of Canada we are still endeavouring to eliminate some of the more objectionable features of the Income Tax Act. Already some favorable amendments have been secured.

"Much time and effort have been spent in formulating plans for the establishment of a Co-operative Wholesale. The major result of this work is a definite agreement on a skeleton plan for a wholesale set-up. But adverse price structures may delay its formation for an indefinite period.

"Considerable work was performed by your President and your Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dennis, along with the Co-operative managers in a combined marketing of potatoes on the "British Order". This scheme was very successful. No doubt our Secretary will give you the details.

"The Co-operative movement in this province has more than 6,000 members. It is a social experiment as well as a business technique. It is high time that the co-operative ideals should be recognized by those who prepare our school curricula.

Before Transport Commission - "The Co-operative Union presented a short brief to the Commission on railway freight increases. This brief was very well received. We expect that it will help to preserve our people from ruinous freight rates. Throughout the year, we had an influx of visitors from various parts of the world to visit our Island co-operatives. An American co-operative leader, Mr. E. R. Bowen a Priest from Chile and a co-operative leader from China. All these men are interested in learning the techniques we are using in our co-operatives.

"On March 18th, we appointed a Director, Mr. Eugene Gorman to fill the unexpired term left vacant by the death of Mr. Napoleos Arsenault. Let us pause a moment to pay tribute to the late Mr. Arsenault who was ever ready to further the co-operative movement. We extend our sincere sympathy to his wife and family in their great loss.

Reports Steady Advance In P.E.I. Co-operatives

The following presidential report was given by Mr. Jerome O'Brien at Wednesday's annual meeting in Summerside of the Co-operative Union of Prince Edward Island Limited.

"It is a great pleasure to welcome such a large audience of delegates and visitors to the third annual meeting of the Co-operative Union of P. E. I. Limited. The Co-operative Union has established a precedent of holding its annual convention in a different centre each year. This policy offers the delegates a change of scenery and a greater opportunity of meeting their fellow co-operators than by holding annual meetings in a central town.

"This year we received an invitation to visit Summerside. We were happy to accept this kind offer.

"The past year has seen a steady advance in our Co-operatives. All co-operatives have increased their membership, assets and turnover. Four new co-operatives have received or are about to receive charters: St. Peter's, St. George's, North Rustico and Southside Fishermen's. Numerous communities are planning the establishment of Co-operatives. The Co-operative Union will supply every assistance possible to groups wishing to enter business on a co-operative basis. There should be no difficulty in foreseeing the establishment of eight to ten new co-operatives before we meet once more.

"I believe we are now on the threshold of an immense co-operative development on P. E. I. but these new and oft-times struggling co-operatives must be guided and controlled, in order to build a solid, united co-operative movement.

"In this Province the function of the Co-operative Union is twofold. One is Co-operative education; the other is supervision (auditing, business advice, etc.) To do a proper job, the Union has to employ more trained personnel to handle its ever increasing load of work. This problem must be tackled and solved when adopting our annual budget for the coming year.

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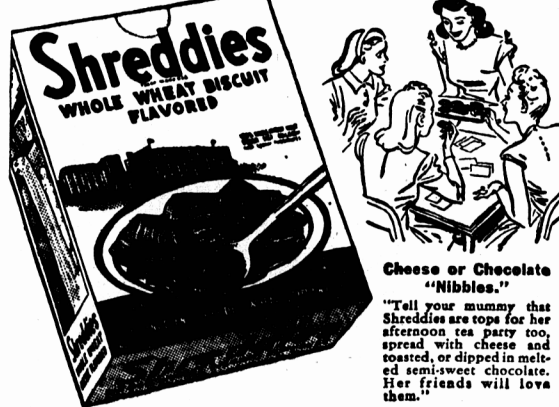
