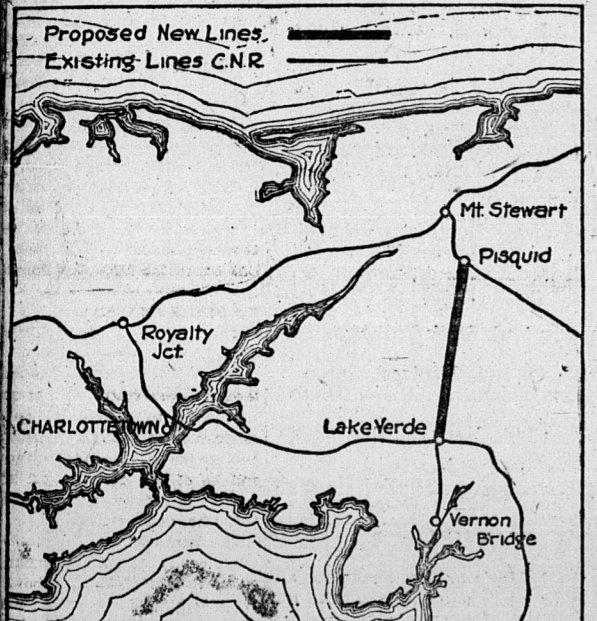

ISLANDER SENDS GIFT.—Responding to the appeal made by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on behalf of the distressing situation in the mining areas of England and Scotland, Mr. John R. McLeod, of Milton P. E. I., formerly of Dartington, P. E. I., who is known for his generosity, sent the magnificent sum of one thousand dollars to this worthy cause. To the Lord Mayor's fund in England he donated five hundred dollars, and five hundred to the Rev. Dr. J. Hall, 232 St. Vincent St., Glasgow, Scotland, who is entrusted by the church there to receive donations of money and clothing on behalf of the distressed miners in Scotland.

GUERNSEY CLUB ORGANIZED.—The Maritime Guernsey Club was organized in St. John Wednesday night. Out of 92 initial pledged members in the three provinces, 35 were present at the meeting. Officers were elected as follows: Honorary president, T. D. Blackie, Great Village, N. S.; president, F. W. Swindells, Princeport, N. S.; vice-president, E. G. McCoolough, Truro; secretary-treasurer, Howard W. Roper, Princeport; directors: for Nova Scotia, Wallace Cook, Yarmouth, V. B. Leonard, Clarence, Howard Smiley, Newport, T. R. Grant, Stellarton; for Prince Edward Island, L. W. Roper, Charlottetown, Capt. John L. Read, Borden; for New Brunswick, C. R. Peters, Hampton; auditor, T. R. Grant, Stellarton. The object of the organization is to get together all the Guernsey breeders of the Maritimes for the furtherance of the industry. Howard W. Roper, of Princeport, was appointed field man.

SENT FOR TRIAL TO HIGHER COURT.—The Summerside police court was again busy on Wednesday, morning and afternoon, in the trial, upon two counts, of John (Nobby) Gallant. The first case against him, which had been part heard on the previous day, related to the breaking, entering and stealing from the Prohibition Vendor's liquor store on Water Street. It came out in the evidence that the accused was the other man wanted in connection with the theft of a quantity of beer from the Vendor's, under circumstances already reported and for which the accused's companion was sent up for trial to the higher court on Saturday last. The second charge against Gallant was for robbery with threats of violence. In this case the evidence given was much the same as that at the trial of the man who was also his companion in this escapade and who was tried last week and sent up to the higher court. Posing as Prohibition Officers two men had accosted a young man proceeding on Water Street and had taken him by the arm to a neighboring horse shed where they searched him for liquor. They found none, but compromised with the victim by him handing them over two dollars under a threat of arrest for creating a disturbance. Besides the evidence given by the victim, two other young men swore that they had been taken to the same shed the same night and searched for liquor by these pretended liquor prosecutors, whom they believed to be genuine. The pseudo-prosecutors made out that they had guns and advised their victims not to run; also that if they made any resistance they would be handcuffed. The accused was committed for trial on both counts to the higher court of jurisdiction.

Prominent Foxman

Returns From Europe

Mr. W. K. Rogers was among the delayed passengers who arrived in the City on Wednesday evening returning from an extended business trip to England and different points in Europe.

Mr. Rogers, who left Saint John by the C. P. R. steamer Metagama, January 11th returned by the S. S. Montrose, sailing from Greenock, the S. S. Melita on which he purposed returning becoming disabled. The Melita on leaving Hamburg ran into a dense fog while in the Elbe and touched bottom with the result that a small leak developed and when the boat reached Southampton the Company decided not to let her sail. As an illustration as to how they take care of their passengers, they held the Montrose at Greenock and ran a special train from Southampton to Greenock on which were all of the Melita passengers and baggage.

While in London Mr. Rogers attended the London Fur Auction Sales of the Hudson's Bay Company, C. M. Lampson & Company, Frederick Huth & Co., also visited the European agencies that he has established for the sale of live foxes, these being in Germany, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland, France and Great Britain.

The market for silver fox pelts at the fur auction sales this year he said, has been the most satisfactory held for several years. While no record prices were obtained, the average was very much better than it has been for several years and the demand was particularly keen. With the finish of Frederick Huth & Company's sale which was the last of the season to be held it meant the finish of selling over fifty thousand skins at auction since the 1st of January. Including the Montreal, New York and London Sales, and notwithstanding that this was the largest number of silver fox pelts ever sold at winter sales, the finish of Fredk. Huth & Co's sale was the strongest of the lot, a very high average price being realized.

The demand for live foxes Mr. Rogers said appears also to be very good but it does not seem possible to obtain the price that should be obtained by breeders for first class stock and with the very keen market for pelts at such attractive prices, Mr. Rogers thinks we would do well to confine ourselves more to breeding for the pelt market. It seems pretty clearly established now that anyone who is producing good fox pelts need have no worry about the market for their product.

The weather in Europe was unusually cold, indeed the coldest known for fifty years and this applied all over the continent. While the Atlantic weather has been very bad for the last three weeks, Mr. Rogers was fortunate both coming and going, having a very comfortable trip.

He speaks very highly of the service of the Canadian Pacific boats. Mr. Rogers found among all the European people a great interest in Canada and a desire for reliable information as to prospects for good settlers here. Last year Mr. Rogers brought out three men from England and this year he has arranged to bring out two good families, who, he hopes will prove good settlers.
