The Assets of O'Leary

In a previous article mention has been made of the needs of O'Leary, now may be said something about the assets of O'Leary, to "count our many blessings," as it were "and name them one by one."

First may be mentioned the splendid means of communications that O'Leary possesses. It has a paved highway, excellent train, and bus service, and when the new West Point to Buctouche ferry service is inaugurated, O'Leary will be very close to Moncton, Shediac, St. John, etc. A new Post office was completed last year, being moved from Mt. Pleasant and is one of the finest in West Prince district.

Secondly, O'Leary has a new school now nearing completion, one of the very best in the entire province.

Thirdly, O'Leary has modern and up to date stores where everything from a common pin to furniture and coal and lumber may be purchased at the lowest possible prices. O'Leary has fine banking facilities and a branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia is located in the village, and the residents get excellent telephone service.

Fourth O'Leary has a fine Co-Operative Store and one of the very best Co-Operative potato warehouses in the Province, just finished in December 1947, 120 ft. long and 40 ft. wide.

Fifth, O'Leary also has a rapidly expanding plant of the Swift Canadian Co. which churns as much as 2600 pounds daily in the rush season and cream for the plant is supplied by eight different routes.

Sixth, O'Leary has a fine modern Rexall Drug Store operated by Mr. A. J. Matheson, a young and efficient physician. Dr. G. L. Dewar and a splendid Nursing Home operated by Mrs. Turner.

Seventh, O'Leary boasts a modern theatre "The Verdun" where shows may be seen practically every night of the week. Movies are also shown in the Hall on Friday and Saturdays.

Eighth, O'Leary has four up-to-date garages where skillful mechanics are always available to fix any make of car.

Ninth, O'Leary has two meat shops, three barber shops, a clothing and shoe store, several restaurants, etc., which are always ready and willing to serve the public. In addition, Mr. Fred Champlain furnishes an excellent electric service with continuous electric power available.

Tenth, Finally we may say that adequate means exist to care for the spiritual needs of the residents. Toronto is called "Toronto the Good" because it is a city of Churches. O'Leary may also be called a village of Churches. In O'Leary itself there is the large United Church of Canada, also the Nazarene Church and a Roman Catholic Church. About two miles away in Knutsford there is the United Baptist Church. Three miles in the other direction at O'Leary Corner is the Anglican Church. Then two miles from the Anglican Church is the large Roman Catholic Church at St. Anthony (Bloomfield) and also the Bloomfield United Church. Near O'Leary at West Devon (7 miles away) besides the West Devon United Church, which is over one hundred years old, there is also a "Church of God." At Coleman, about five miles from O'Leary is "The Church of Scotland" and not far from it the Free United Church. There is a splendid fellowship between the Churches and some fine work is being done in all of them year by year.

Kensington Hockey

Campbell and he was the outstanding performer on the team, his blocking was a treat and his rushes ending with a bullet-like drive kept the fans on their toes. For the losers Don Baker, that capable net custodian was at his best and some of his stops were of the sensational type. D. MacInnis in the New Annan net played a steady game all the way through.

First Period
The first period started very fast and the goalies turned back thrust after thrust on their citadels.

W. Campbell received a push on his head from a skate and was forced to retire for a time. The period was nearly over when Reade soloed through the whole team and drew Baker to one side and slapped the puck in the opposite corner as he cut across the goal-mouth. Then shortly after Chubby Mill carried the puck into the Legion end and passed to C. Mill who dented the twines. Period ending, New Annan 2, Legion 0.

The second period saw the Legion putting on a spirited drive but were held at bay by a stout defence together with steady play by McInnis. About midway in the period MacEntee scored for New Annan on passes from MacKenna and W. Mill. Period ending New Annan 3, Legion 0.

Third Period
This period was decidedly Legion as they stormed in and around New Annan goal for minutes at a time and were rewarded when R. Howard accepted McNeil's pass to beat McInnis cleanly.

The same player scored his second goal shortly after when C. Champlain set him up on a lovely pass and he made no mistake. Then Wendell Mill scored the final goal of the game as he broke away from a Legion gangling attack to go right in on Baker who had no chance. Final score, New Annan 4, Legion 2.
