### Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$300 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years after entering homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside on the land in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

### GERMANY STRONGER LEAN THAN FAT

At the beginning of the war the German nation was the most overfed nation in the world; they surfeited on beer and sausage and the world thought that by a food embargo the well-fed Teutons could be quickly brought to terms. But with the cutting off of food supplies Germany rationed her people, reduced their waist-lines, and increased their fighting powers. For three years now they have waged war on short rations and have amazed the world by their fighting strength. It is a poor hunter who would not rather tackle a fat and surfeited lion than a lean and hungry one; and a Germany with unrestricted beer and sausages might have been more easily vanquished than the hungry-rationed Germany which has defied the world for three years past.

Starving out the enemy to be effective must be real starvation and not merely a cutting off of surplus food. The efficient nation and the efficient individual is the one fed just enough to maintain hard muscular fighting trim. It means a food consumption of from ten to twenty-five per cent. less than the food quantity eaten when the human animal is allowed to help himself at will after the manner of hopper-fed hogs.—Physical Culture.

### CAMOUFLAGE

Most of us have a general idea that this new and overworked word "Camouflage" refers chiefly to deceptive coloring on ships and battle paraphernalia.

But as a matter of fact it's one of the commonest features of civil life. Probably nine-tenths of us have been camouflaging during the larger part of our lives. We've been trying to seem what we are not—to look richer, wiser and more important than Providence and fortune have made us. This is usually a harmless sort of camouflage, though it sometimes leads to extravagance and financial run.

But the kind of camouflage that is insidious and dangerous in the United States just now is what we might call patriotic camouflage. The German propagandist camouflages himself as an apostle of democracy and a pacifist; the disloyal senator camouflages himself as a watchdog of the treasury; a ferretter out of extravagance, a protagonist of efficiency and a guardian of the rights of the legislative over the executive branches of the government—also a defender of the constitution. (Ever notice that the servant of privilege is usually the most zealous and solicitous about the sacredness of the constitution?) The profiteer camouflages himself with a few Liberty Bonds as a patriot, and

tries to conceal his rapacity under the deceptive coloring of war necessity. Then, there are the women—proportionately rare but actually numerous, who camouflage their selfishness and inutility behind knitting needles—who knit scarfs and sweaters for themselves—and the hotel and restaurant keepers who camouflage their greed behind Hoover menus, where the portion is halved and the price doubled; and about 77 other brands of patriotic camouflagers who put things over on their fellow countrymen and often deceive even themselves into believing that they are useful and loyal Americans.

No, camouflage isn't confined to the battlefield, and now is an excellent time for everybody to take a searching look at themselves and their neighbors and discover just how much is genuine and how much is paint.

**SHEPHERD'S PIE.**

Two cups cooked meat, one cup stock, one tablespoon fat, one tablespoon flour, one-fourth teaspoon salt, pepper, two cups mashed potatoes. Put diced meat into a baking dish. Add brown sauce made of fat, flour, seasonings and stock. Cover top with mashed potatoes, brush with fat and brown in oven.
