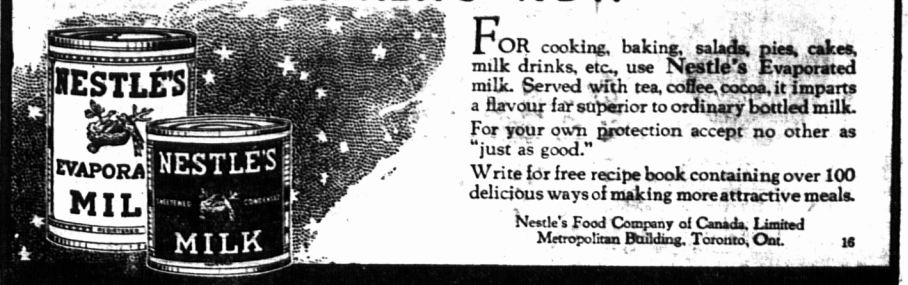

SCHEDULE OF RATES EFFECTIVE SEPT. 17TH, 1928 DOMESTIC SERVICE

SERVICE CHARGE - In residences having a floor area of 1200 square feet or less - 75 cents per month. With a minimum charge of 75c.

In residences having a floor area of more than 1200 sq. feet @ \$1.00 per month with a minimum charge of \$1.00.

ENERGY CHARGE - In residences having a floor area of 1200 sq. feet or less:

- 1st 17 K. W. Hrs. used per month @ 7c per K. W. Hr.
- Over 17 K. W. Hrs. used per month @ 3 1-2c per K. W. Hr.

In residences having a floor area of more than 1200 sq. feet:

- 1st 30 K. W. Hrs. used per month @ 7c per K. W. Hr.
- Over 30 K. W. Hrs. used per mth. @ 3 1-2c per K. W. Hr.

MINIMUM BILL - (\$2.50 per month where an Electric Range is installed).

COMMERCIAL SERVICE - (Based on minimum of 500 watts connected load).

- 300 per 100 watts for the 1st 2000 watts of connected load.
- 20c per 100 watts for the next 3000 watts of connected load.
- 15c per 100 watts for all over 5000 watts of connected load.

ENERGY CHARGE - 1st 100 K. W. Hrs. used per month @ 7c per K. W. Hr.

- Over 100 K. W. Hrs. used per mth. @ 3 1-2c per K. W. Hr.
