## Brilliant Finish To Meet Sees Five New Records Set

### Last Day Of Penn. Relay Carnival Attracts Crowd Of 45,000. Cunningham Beats Venzke In Mile.

(C. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) PHILADELPHIA, April 29.—After a drab beginning, the 40th Pennsylvania Relay Carnival today had been brought to a brilliant, record-smashing conclusion.

A crowd of 45,000, largest ever to witness a track meet in the East, saw the crack athletes break five new records in a succession of thrilling performances winding up the Carnival last night.

Glenn Cunningham, the Kansas clyde, added another gem to his mile-running crown by taking the measure of his slim Pennsylvania rival, Gene Venzke, in the track record time of 4:11.8 for the day's spotlight conquest, while Cornell University's squad staged a comeback by sharing the major relay racing honors with the fleet sons of Indiana.

Unable to win a single relay feature since 1922, Cornell celebrated his return to the heights by bagging three titles. The big red sprinters romped off with the 880-yard championship after capturing the 440 Friday and the Cornell Timber-Toppers captured the 400-yard shuttle hurdle relay in the new carnival record time of 1:02.4 in the final after trying the old mark in their first test.

Two stalwart southerners, competing in special events blasted Cornell in the 100-yard dash. The University of North Carolina hurled the javelin 214 feet, 8 1/2 inches, and M. Zori of North Carolina State sent the discus spinning 181 feet, 1 inch.

93,000 SEE MANCHESTER CITY WIN CUP

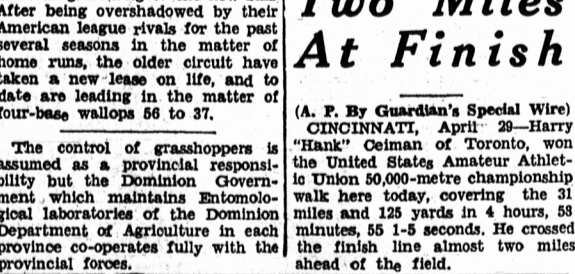
