All along Bedeque Road there are many im- proving their stock. I have seen in Springtown several pure bred cattle.— Donald Cameron has two pure bred bulls, one a Shorthorn, and the other an Ayrshire; they are two splendid animals. Mr. Cameron bought the animals two years ago from the Government farm, and last fall bought a beautiful Ayrshire heifer at the same place. The owner deserves credit for his enterprise; he has al- so other fine grades in his herd of cattle.— Mr. Malcolm Nicholson has a pure bred Ayrshire cow, bought at Government Stock Farm, which is a credit to him. He has also some fine graded cattle.—Mr. Nell McLeod has a very fine horse sired by old Balston. He is a splendid specimen of horse-flesh. The horse is a dark bay, five years old, and weighs 1300 lbs. I am informed that he is very speedy, and that his stock is first class.—A good many more farmers there are seeing that it is time to do away with all scrubs and in- vest their money in pure bred stock.—I approve very much of the action of the Government in bringing pure stock to the Island. It will enable the farmers to pur- chase the stock they require as the Gov- ernment calls a sale once a year.
